

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lanning for a successful financial future means keeping your eyes on trends and if investing in real estate, like many do, knowing when the market is at its high. 
All in all, the real estate market we are currently experiencing is exceptionally healthy with a pronounced lack of volatility, increased options for buyers, and a more robust buyer pool.

Riot in RiNo

Noble Riot is Denver's new wine bar paradigm

Back when Troy Bowen and Scott Mattson were working at Denver's Mondo Vino wine shop around 2012, they had a pretty good thing going. "We loved the wines we were selling and we loved our guests," Bowen recounts. There was just one small gap. "We'd talk about the wines, have passionate conversations, and send them out to the world. There was no chance to engage with people while they were drinking the wines."

That revelation planted the seed for what would blossom into Noble Riot, Denver's newest and most dynamic wine bar, which Bowen and Mattson opened with Nicole Mattson (Scott's wife) and Joel Kampfe in April of this year. Tucked into a vibrant alley in the heart of River North, this bright, 40-seat wine bar is one part hip hangout, one part welcoming refuge. "It's a weird combination," Bowen says. "It's very much of the neighborhood. It's fun, funky, and connected and tied to what RiNo was and what's it's become."

We'd argue that it's weird in the best way. Enter through the street art-soaked alleyway to the intimate space, where floor-to-ceiling windows welcome plenty of late afternoon light reflected by blond wood accents and decorative wine bottles. It's cozy — though Noble Riot intends to expand the space to about three times its current size later this year.

For now, guests can take a seat at the bar, banquettes or community table, and flip open the menu — or, rather, the zine. The slim black-and-white booklet lists musings, a manifesto, and the available wines, all of them limited production, biodynamic or otherwise low-intervention vino by the glass and by the bottle.

And yet, the best experience will be when you put down that menu. You aren't likely to find your go-to Sauv Blanc here, anyway, and the wines on hand are constantly changing. At Noble Riot, it's best instead to start a conversation, taste a flight or two, and go on a winetasting adventure. "We're engendering this spirit of fascination and revelation and community and mayhem and a little bit of fun," Bowen says. "Those things happen a lot better when you're looking up versus looking down."

Which is how we arrive back to that early revelation. Because while there's no doubt that Bowen and his team are the geekiest of wine geeks, the goal at Noble Riot is about more than just wine; it's about creating an experience. It's about interaction at the community table, adventuring into the unknown through sips and gulps and garnering a new perspective as you go. It's about creating a moment in time, and — above all — having fun. "Life is too short to drink a bad wine," Bowen says. "We're gonna find out what it is you love, and we're going to go for it."

Vant a taste of what Noble Riot is serving this summer? Below, Bowen shares some of his favorite wines of the moment:

Martha Stoumen Post-Flirtation White

"Martha is a badass winemaker who traveled to France, Germany, New Zealand and Sicily then back home to Sonoma County seeking the best winemakers she could find. Her wines are expressive, sexy and easy to drink. This is a blend of grapes normally found in southern France, but on the palate, it's all California sunshine and pleasure."

Gut Oggau Theodora

"This Austrian producer makes some very fun unfiltered wines without additives or chemicals. The wines are named after family members, who are artistically represented on the labels. This white wine — named after one of the family's daughters — is a bright and perky blend of Gruner Veltliner and Welschriesling with a pretty undercurrent of savory mystique."

Vina Gonzales Bastias Naranjo

"This is an enchanting orange wine — which is white wine made like a red wine by letting the skins have contact with the juice — that has something for everyone. With a floral jasmine nose and clean, dry apricot and white tea notes on the palate, this is one of our very best sellers from a biodynamic producer who uses no sulfur or machines!"

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


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ate summer in Colorado is a wonder of possibility. The gorgeous, cloudless mornings and cooling monsoon afternoons. The patios and rooftops full of revelers. The outdoor music and warm evening rambles from bar to restaurant to bar to bar and the gentle breeze that accompanies your happy stumble to bed.

But most of all, it's the Palisade peach harvest that makes summer really feel like summer.

Palisade is located on the Western Slope of Colorado, and it's the perfect microclimate for fruit farmers — a lush valley fed by the Colorado River, the area is prized for its rich bounty of orchards.

And all across the state, chefs, brewers, and bartenders keep a lookout for those first crates of fuzzy, sweet goodness, an inspiring and delicious ingredient to infuse into their late summer menus. We asked several what they had in mind for the coming season, and though things can change quickly when you source locally, here's an idea of what they're planning.

Chef Andrea Frizzi at II Posto in the RiNo Art District is adding a sweet and savory Palisade peach risotto with la tur cheese and tarragon to the menu. The dish will pair well with their simple and elegant "secondi," like the duck breast or rack of lamb. But be sure to order the house beef tallow candle with ciabatta to start things off — it's every bit as indulgent as it sounds.

Over in the Congress Park neighborhood of Denver, local legend Chef Jeff Osaka will feature peaches prominently at 12@Madison, the flagship of his restaurant group.

"Most people lean to a sweet dish or dessert when using peaches," he says. "But I like a savory application with pork chops and peaches. The typical combination with pork chops is apples or applesauce, but when Palisade peaches are in season it's hard to resist." Chef Osaka deglazes the skillet he uses for the pork chops with chicken stock, then adds in sliced peaches, butter, and soy sauce.

Up in the hills above Boulder is one of the most beautiful restaurants in the state. The Flagstaff House, with its awe-inducing views of the city below, will be all about Palisade peaches when they make their way to the Front Range.

Executive Chef and owner Chris Royster will feature the fruit across several dishes, from a smoked Palisade peach, cucumber, and pretzel panzanella to a chilled peach soup with black pepper ham, grilled peaches, and thyme. He'll also pair peaches with duck breast and an earl grey risotto. The Flagstaff House's desserts are a highlight of any meal, and their lavender poached Palisade peaches with candied ginger streusel, vanilla yogurt, and brown butter pound cake will wrap up the evening perfectly.

Hearth & Dram near Union Station takes the novel approach of adding Palisades to their in-house pickling program, and then integrating them into their seasonal menu. In the works this summer is a pickled peach panzanella salad with nardello peppers and cornbread croutons. Don't be surprised if you find something equally inventive on the cocktail menu, too.

Of course, if you really want to celebrate the season, then heading over the mountains to Riverbend Park in the Town of Palisade is the only way to go. The three-day Palisade Peach Festival is August 15-18, and it's truly the best way to eat all the peaches, in every form imaginable. From fresh off the tree to pie to pickles, this extravaganza is definitely not the pits. Sign up for a "Feast in the Fields," where tables are set up in the orchards themselves; get messy at the BBQ throwdown; learn from local chefs as they demonstrate techniques; or test your mettle during the peach-eating contest.

And while you're on the Western Slope, do not miss a chance to eat at Bin 707 Foodbar in Grand Junction, one of the top restaurants in Colorado. My pal, award-winning chef Josh Niernberg is all about peaches yearround (they sell the heck out of their bourbon peach cobbler every day), but especially when the season hits at the end of July. Bin 707 sources their peaches exclusively from High Country Orchards nearby, and they always roll out something special in season. This year, they're planning on Palisade heirlooms and peaches, with stracciatella, lovage, lemon balm, Koji Vin, and wild-caught Gulf shrimp "aguachile."

They'll use house-made peach jam for their extensive charcuterie and cheese program, but be sure to order the Palisade Peach Pow cocktail to start your meal.

Chef Niernberg's sister restaurant Taco Party (also in Grand Junction) will highlight the local wonders as well. "We will use the peaches with Big B's Apple Cider Vinegar and fresh locally grown jalapeños to make a gastrique to use throughout the menu in place of citrus," he says. "For instance, our guacamole will have fresh peaches and the peach jalapeño gastrique, rather than lime juice. It's one of our many tricks to use and source local and help define 'Colorado cuisine' through the lens of Southwestern food."

Back in Denver, Chef Troy Guard, overlord of many popular local restaurants, will modify his Mister Tuna's King Crab, which is a signature dish at the restaurant. Made with Rebel Farms arugula, brown butter, and black lava salt, the indulgent entrée incorporates seasonal fruit to bring in a balanced sweetness. It's especially popular when the local peaches are in season.

"Welcome Home Oscar" from Ste. Ellie

One of my favorite summer delights is Chef Carrie Baird's Palisade peach pizza. Lovingly wood-fired, and with a garlic oil base, it's topped with roasted peaches, prosciutto, capicola, aged mozzarella, balsamic reduction and arugula (I eat it without the pork, and it's still spectacular).

Last year, restaurant empire builder Chef Frank Bonanno launched "BOCO Peach Week," celebrating the fuzzy wonders in all of his restaurants around Denver. This year, each Bonanno Concept restaurant will feature Palisades in their cocktails, desserts and special menu items throughout the week. They're also planning a peach dinner at Osteria Marco in Larimer Square.

Colorado's bar magicians will be incorporating Palisades into their concoctions as well.

You can experience the joy of the season right this moment in Infinite Monkey Theorem's canned Peach Bellini. Whether you visit the local winery at their RiNo tasting room and pair your balanced bubbly beverage (made with sparkling Riesling and Palisade peach juice) with food truck fare, or ask for it in just about any local bar or restaurant, or just pick up a four-pack at a local grocery store and take it with you, you'll rejoice in the fizzy fun that opening a can unleashes. They ship, too!

Eli Kerlin at The Way Back in the Highlands has his own plan for the summer bounty, with an as-yet unnamed cocktail comprised of vodka, fresh peach juice, Creme de Violette from the local Golden Moon Distillery, and sparkling wine. It'll be that perfect balance of rich, acidic, and bubbly.

Over at Ace Eat Serve, their Peach Slushy is made with white wine and lemon and served with a peach slice — drink this Slurpee for grownups on their excellent patio.

Dion Griego, bar manager at the Ste. Ellie on Platte St., is mixing up a refreshing summer cocktail he calls "Welcome Home Oscar," which is a fun and frisky mix of Fidencio Mezcal, Amaro Nonino, fresh Palisade peach syrup, pineapple juice, and lime juice.

Up over the Highland Bridge at Mizu, the award-winning rockstar TJ Vong has his own fancy confection in the works for peach season, called "Expect the Unexpected." The bourbon cocktail, with help from nigori sake, brûléed peach thyme syrup, and lemon, is served over pebble ice for a cold and warm sensation all at once.


And what would peach season be without all of the desserts?

Smōk in The Source Hotel is known for their kick-ass meats, but that's not keeping Bill Espiricueta, executive chef and owner of the joint, from using his considerable chops to bring something special to the season. His peach hand pies, all sweet and flaky goodness, will have just a touch of the savory — an essential element from the beacon of barbecue.

At Steuben's (Uptown and in Arvada), one of my all-time favorite pastry chefs, the indomitable Nadine Donovan, will serve up her Fried Palisade Peach Pie, along with a range of house-made ice creams (no doubt you'll find endless additional treats highlighting the fuzzy fruit).

If you're looking for healthy and casual fare, Olive & Finch won't disappoint. This summer, Chef Mary Nguyen is planning a Palisade peach honey mousse cake, with panna cotta and white chocolate.

With a snowy mountain winter and a mild, rainy spring on the Western Slope, this year's peach harvest is expected to be particularly bountiful. That's good news for locals and visitors, because it means the bumper crop of peaches (and apricots, too!) will be making their way to our plates and glasses in late summer.



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It Must Be Summer!

There are so many unique and interesting things to do, places to go and sites to see in Colorado. Here are a few city-bound events that are certain to infuse a ray of summer sunshine in the mix.



Sistine Chapel Exhibit at The Stanley

People are raving about the internationally acclaimed Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel Exhibition, an immersive presentation of museum-quality, near life-size reproductions of the iconic master's frescoes that adorn the Sistine Chapel

in Rome. The exhibit, in The Hangar at Stanley Marketplace through August 13, allows visitors to experience one of the world's greatest artistic achievements: Michelangelo's renowned ceiling frescoes from the Vatican's Sistine Chapel, reproduced in near-original size in a format that allows viewers to get face-to-face with the masterpieces. Through 34 artfully displayed reproductions, this innovative presentation includes pieces like *The Creation of Adam* and *The Last Judgment* and brings them just a few feet away from the audience.


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


tains, the downtown skyline and everything Cherry Creek has to offer. Rotating cocktail selections, wines by the glass, craft beers and lite bites combine in a refreshing outdoor living space to cre-

ate your elevated experience. Happy hour, late night or somewhere in between – Elevated is where you want to be seen. Located atop Halcyon, a hotel in Cherry Creek.

"Milk Market is a gateway to Denver," says Bonanno. "Straight from the airport, it's where out-of-town guests come first to get settled and learn about our incredible city. From the initial conception of the space, we strove to be so much more than just a food hall. Working with our local institutions like the Denver Zoo, the Denver Museum of Nature and Science, and local vendors big and small throughout the city, Milk Market is constantly activated and a community platform promoting unity in downtown Denver."

Take a lap through Milk Market, and you'll find bars, sit-down restaurants, quick-service food counters, and a New York-style pizza slice concept called Engine Room out on the alley. What makes the market especially unique is the way it was all created, curated, and cultivated by Chef Bonanno and his team. It's a one-stop way to experience the many facets of the elevated cuisine Bonanno brings to Denver.

But the Dairy Block is more than the Milk Market, with several additional Denver legends contributing to the "micro-district" as well.



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Chef Kelly Whitaker, known for his Italian-inspired-with-a-twist cuisine, has two concepts inside Free Market, which spans a quarter of the block on the alley. Chef Whitaker is a champion of house-milled grains, and restaurants Brutø and BØH are no exception. Brutø's flatbreads and other grain-based delights are roasted in a Stefano Ferrara pizza oven imported from Naples, and the raw bar is a perfect spot for oysters and bubbly. Meanwhile, the coffee counter BØH serves up fresh pastries and breads, along with other grain goodness (like porridge and polenta).

Over in the Maven Hotel, stop in at Kachina Southwestern Grill for Frito pie (served properly, with the bag), Navajo tacos, and a Colorado bison empanada.

The bar scene in the Dairy Block is compelling enough to keep a proper cocktail lover set for a full evening (see sidebar). From the whimsical stylings of Devin Chapnick at Poka Lola, to the Derby-themed Run for the Roses speakeasy (where local fave Steven Waters employs some of the most beloved bartenders in the city), to the whiskey-flavored Seven Grand, not to mention Blanchard Family Wines for the oenophile in your crew, the drinks are a good reason to stick around.

"You could visit daily and experience something new each time," says Bonanno. "Every day, every hour is truly different." The morning coffee rush transitions to the business lunch; indulgent afternoons become happy hour reunions. The dinner and nightlife crowds turn up just as the alley's festive lights and public art come alive for the evening.

The founders think of it as a "retail test kitchen," where local retailers can set up shop for whatever amount of time that makes sense — pop-up or long term — getting immediate feedback about their products.

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

Raise a Glass

Where to grab a drink at the Dairy Block

The Dairy Block is one of the hottest new places to grab a drink in Denver, and there is no shortage of options. Here are a few of our current favorite places to stop in for a cocktail:

Run for the Roses

You've never seen a basement bar as bright and sophisticated as Run for the Roses. This subterranean refuge opened in the Dairy Block in May of this year, where owner Steven Waters has enlivened the space into an elegant and inclusive cocktail lounge. Finding the nondescript entrance and journeying through the dim corridor might feel like discovering a speakeasy, but the transparent glass front and welcoming host reveal that there's no need for special passwords here. The only difficulty will be choosing a beverage from the 52-card menu of classic cocktails. Waters suggests going with his take on a Daiquiri (Bacardi Silver rum, fresh lime, demerara sugar and Plantation Xaymaca rum), which he says is one of his favorite cocktails of all time. www.rftrbar.com

Blanchard Family Wines

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
COLORADO CLASSICS

Your Bucket List of the Best of Colorado

ewcomer or native, Colorado offers a fantastic array of unique and once-in-a lifetime experiences, running the gamut from great food to fun festivals. Following is the ultimate checklist of 31 must-do activities in the Centennial State.



IS: Everywhere

- Sample a Rocky Mountain Oyster. No bull: prepared well, they're a local delicacy. Thin sliced, battered in corn meal flour and deep fried, they're available at classic Western eateries like The Fort in Morrison (a replica of Bent's Fort) or The Buckhorn Exchange (Denver's oldest restaurant, it's full of artifacts of the old west).
- 2 Sip a marg at The Rio. The state's local Colo-Mex chain serves legendary margaritas whose top-secret recipe carries such a kick there's a three drink per-person limit.
- Savor high tea at the Brown Palace Hotel.

 Denver's oldest hotel, nearly every president and countless celebs have held court there over the years.

 Offered daily in the elegant lobby, high tea is accompanied by long-timer John Kite tickling the ivories.
- 4 Indulge in fresh and local produce. Colorado is home to some incredible seasonal produce, despite the short growing season. Sample Palisade peaches, Rocky Ford melons and Olathe sweet corn whenever possible.
- 5 Sip a martini at the Cruise Room. The historic pink-hued deco bar is inside the Oxford Hotel, lined with panels depicting "cheers" in several languages. Legend has it that the bar once featured a pro-Nazi panel torn down by a group pf Marines, it was never seen again.
- Take a distillery tour. Stranahan's was a Colorado first, but many others have followed suit in Denver (Laws Whiskey House, Golden Moon, and Leopold Bros. to name a few metro-area faves) and beyond (Peach Street, Marble, Woody Creek, Montanya... the list goes on).
- Grab a legendary late-night burger at My Brother's Bar. While development has sprouted up around it, this LoDo stronghold (in a building dating back from the 1880s) has no plans of going anywhere. Good thing its burgers are a Denver classic.
- Go to the Great American Beer Festival. Or, if that's too overwhelming/tickets are gone, consider checking out places like Falling Rock, whose rotating craft beer selection offers a slice of what's at the fest.
- Go to Casa Bonita. The kitschy landmark isn't known for its food (get the sopapillas) but it's a must-do at least once while in Denver.




Ashcroft Ghost Town

- Hike the Manitou Incline. The popular staircase-style hike climbs 2,000 feet in elevation to reach the summit, but the view at the top is worth the sweat.
- Visit a ghost town. To name a few, St. Elmo, Ashcroft, and Dearfield are all remnants of Colorado's Gold Rush days. Gold Hill, near Boulder, may look like a ghost town, but is still a thriving small community.
- Soak in a natural hot springs. Historic Glenwood Springs is the world's largest, Steamboat's Strawberry Park is clothing-optional after dark, part of Mt. Princeton is in a river and Dunton Hot Springs is part of a luxurious resort whatever your choice, it's a must.
- Visit Mesa Verde and the Four Corners. Mesa Verde is the home of the Ancestral Puebloans, who built the phenomenal cliff dwellings in the 12th century. It's a breathtaking, once-in-a-lifetime experience to explore their way of life. Nearby, you can literally be in four states at once, where you can straddle the spot where the borders of Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and Utah meet at the Four Corners.









- Go to a Dude Ranch. You'll ride horseback, learn what it's really like to wrangle cattle, fly fish, hike, learn to two-step and best of all, get away from the daily grind. Options range from the reasonably priced Rainbow Trout Ranch (only an hour from downtown) to the Home Ranch, near Steamboat Springs, a luxury Relais & Chateaux property.
- Stay at the Stanley Hotel. Stephen King's visit to the notoriously haunted hotel inspired him to write *The Shining*. At the gateway of Rocky Mountain National Park, the historic hotel offers special events surrounding its colorful past with a backdrop of mountain peaks.
- Glamp in a yurt. The Mongolian round tents are an affordable and comfortable alternative to either a hotel or tent camping. They're found all over the state, and most offer some amenities and on-property activities. The Platte River Fort Resort & Event Center, near Greeley, is the state's newest option.





- Experience wild animals in an unforgettable habitat. The 780-acre Wild Animal Sanctuary is home to more than 500 lions, tigers, bears, leopards, mountains lions and other large carnivores rescued from around the world. Travel along the elevated mile-long walkway and watch these wonderful animals below, as they frolic, feed and meander in an incredible environment featuring species-specific habitats. Or, get cozy with wolves. At the Colorado Wolf and Wildlife Center in Divide, the pack is so tame visitors can literally get close enough to get a wolf kiss. Oh, and also get a ton of education about what makes wolves so special.
- Summit a '14er. Peak baggers know that Colorado has the most peaks with an elevation of 14,000 feet or more of any state. Every Coloradan has to climb at least one the easiest for beginners are Longs Peak and Bierstadt.
- Go leaf peeping. Colorado's fall foliage is viewable during a fleeting window of just a few weeks in mid-September. The I-70 corridor offers great scenic drives, but for best results, seek out some back roads for a beautiful weekend afternoon.
- Go to a Pow Wow. Witnessing members of the 568 recognized Native American tribes in the United States gather together in traditional dress to dance to ceremonial music is an awe-inspiring experience. Pow Wows are held almost year-round across the state research etiquette before you go.



- Take a classic photo at Maroon Bells, a hike near star-studded ski retreat Aspen. Treat yourself to an Aspen getaway while you're at it but do it like a local. Stay at the cozy (think in-room fireplaces and private hot tubs) and affordable Molly Gibson, stroll the walkable downtown area for some shopping, hit the mining museum, the art museum and the opera house, attend an outdoor concert, chat with locals (everyone in Aspen has a story) and have a nightcap at Jimmy's, an Aspen institution.
- Channel your inner hippie in Boulder. Cruise Pearl Street Mall and watch some buskers, chill at Chautauqua Park, and check out the remarkable Dushanbe Tea House. Fondly known as 'the Republic,' it's the place to get your chakras aligned, buy some mala beads and do all kinds of yoga.
- Visit a dispensary. Colorado was the first state to legalize recreational marijuana use, so it's a rite of passage to go to a pot shop this is not your mother's weed.

Sounds of Music

Colorado's Music Scene Moves to a Higher Level



hen it comes to music, Colorado hands-down is one of the country's top places for pretty much any type of performance. The thing is, musicians want to play here, especially in the summer when they can choose from a wide variety of wonderful outdoor venues. From picturesque Red Rocks to the serene beauty of The Denver Botanic Gardens, performers love to strut their stuff, and audiences love listening to their sounds.



For more insight into the local music scene, we spoke with Libby Anschutz, who has music in her bones and songs in her head. For Anschutz, it's about more than making great music, it's also about giving back in meaningful ways. The lowkey easy-going bandleader daughter of Colorado money-man Phil Anschutz, she believes in philanthropy and in giving back to the state and country that have embraced her brand and her band.

"I am philanthropy-minded," she says. "I hope that all people want to be."

Her band is Track Suit Wedding, a soulful rock combo that plays these parts and beyond: Red Rocks, the intimate alt theater venues in Denver, the Broadmoor (dad's B&B), and street festivals, most recently Day of Rock. Track Suit Wedding was a standout there in May among 25 bands on five stages – all to raise money for Amp the Cause, a non-profit run by Denver power-couple Walter and Christie Isenberg that supports child-focused health and educational organizations.

Anschutz joined spoken-word, hip hop, jazz artist Michael Franti and legendary Colorado promoter Chuck Morris on a trip to Uganda in March for the Global Livingston Institute. They performed at huge festivals with Ugandan music stars to bring out thousands of people for music and medicine – free testing for HIV, cervical cancer and a dose of family planning. The online videos of the concerts are impressive and moving.

"I often go back to look at the photos and watch the videos because I want to have that experience again," Anschutz told CBS in a recent interview. "It's that powerful to me."

Franti, an activist in many arenas, is a native Californian but he spends so much time in Colorado we have adopted him. He performed a free concert in Denver this spring, he played Aspen on June 4 and filled up Red Rocks with his band Spearhead on June 7. The Red Rocks gig included a VIP party for local nonprofit *Take Note Colorado*.

Anschutz and Franti hopped on then-Governor John Hickenlooper's idea to encourage all Colorado students to take up music, making instruments and instruction readily available in public schools. Dubbed Take Note Colorado, the agency hosts concerts all year long featuring Colorado's biggest names (members of the The Fray, Big Head Todd & the Monsters, The Lumineers, Track Suit Wedding, Michael Franti & Spearhead). This year Take Note Colorado once again tops off with the annual Sing It To Me Santa, a Dec. 7 extravaganza at the Ogden Theatre.

The Lumineers is another wildly popular hometown band that supports Take Note Colorado. Band cofounder Wesley Schultz explains his passion for Colorado and music. "Ten years ago, Jer (cofounder Jeremiah Fraite) and I moved to Denver and have called it home ever since. There's been a lot of growth and change for our band and our city in that time." This August, The Lumineers are slated to be the opening act at the much-anticipated Mission Ballroom, a state-of-the-art venue in RiNo operated by AEG Presents Rocky Mountain.

"We feel lucky to be a part of history by opening the Mission Ballroom. We are also happy announce that this show will benefit a school which is local to the venue -- Wyatt Academy -- by keeping its music program alive through the donations and proceeds of our Mission Ballroom show."

There's a lot of giving from Anschuhtz, Franti and The Lumineers. And in Colorado, fans give the love right back.

"I believe in random acts of kindness," says Anschutz. "Do the right thing when nobody is looking. I hope that's not a fairy tale."



Festivals of Every Flavor

Summer in Colorado is all about being outside. Hiking, camping, patio sipping, al fresco dining, lazy days by a rooftop pool. The dry heat and sun have truly settled in, with the cooling punctuation of afternoon rainstorms breaking up the day.

And the faceted festivals across the state roll out week after week, with something fun to experience all the way into September, when the days stay warm but grow a little shorter.

How to decide where to spend your precious weekends of warmth and wonder? Just depends on what you love.



Whether you want to taste a ton of seasonal brews or dig into bites of locally sourced treats, Colorado still has quite a few food festivals left this season.

The **Slow Food Nations** festival is celebrating another big year in Denver July 19-21. This year's theme celebrates "Where Tradition Meets Innovation," and you won't want to miss the Taste Marketplace in Larimer Square, where the street is shut down to celebrate a diversity of cultures and traditions while advocating for "good, clean, and fair food." Supported by workshops, talks, and other festivities, the three-day experience will leave you with deeper intention about what you eat and why.

If you're on the Western Slope of Colorado, you'll want to hit up the **Palisade Peach Festival** from August 15-18 (see page 14 for more details about peach season), but don't miss the Olathe Sweet Corn Festival about an hour down the road at Montrose County Event Center on August 3. Celebrate the joys of those precious kernels and live music all day while supporting local nonprofits.

If you're in Downtown Denver on August 15 and are hit with the smell of grilled meat wafting through the city, hoof it over to **RARE**, the Denver Steak Championships, in the Galleria space at the Denver Center for the Performing Arts. Help judge the steak stylings of more than 20 Denver chefs as they compete to serve perfect bites paired with unique cocktails. With both classic and traditional competitions, RARE is going to be very well done.

And at the end of August, over Labor Day Weekend, be sure to attend **The Taste of Colorado** in Civic Center Park, where you'll dig into menu items from 50-plus local restaurants. With sample bites or full dishes, you can stroll and graze for three days straight. If that's not entertaining enough, stick around for live music, arts and crafts booths, and activities for the kids.

Finally, the **Denver Food and Wine Festival** runs September 4-8, and it's an elevated experience. The Grand Tasting at the Pepsi Center Fairgrounds hosts more than 40 Colorado restaurants with hundreds of wine and spirits to go with the fancy dishes. Other events over the course of the four days include wine seminars, The Shakedown bartender competition, a brunch festival at the Dairy Block, and even Dinner Under the Stars. Colorado's food scene just gets better and better, and this festival showcases just how that's happening.



The Rocker

Speaking of music, summer is made for outdoor shows. And whether you're looking for a dusty mosh pit or a refined strings serenade, you'll find it in Colorado.

A celebration of local music, **The Underground Music Showcase** (aka The UMS) takes over South Broadway the last weekend of July, and it's a rare treat. Literally hundreds of bands representing a dramatically diverse array of styles, will play over the course of the festival. From indoor venues to rooftops to outdoor stages, bands, singer-songwriters, DJs, and more will keep you dancing for three long, happy days and nights. Wear comfortable shoes.


Several thousand bluegrass lovers will convene on the little town of Westcliffe, Colorado for the **High Mountain Hay Fever Bluegrass Festival** July 11-14. Set in the gorgeous high plains of south central Colorado, the event will feature more than a dozen bands over the three evenings — a mix and match of bands and singers in one of only 14 Dark Sky regions in the world. Which means stunning mountain views during the day and stellar sky-watching each night.

Want to celebrate local brews with your bluegrass? Then zip up I-70 for Keystone's 23^{rd} annual **Bluegrass and Beer Festival**, August 3 and 4. With three stages and more than 40 featured craft beers, expect serious mountain music mayhem. Keystone also hosts its **Wine and Jazz Festival** July 13 and 14, and **Mountain Town Music Festival** on August 17. Lots of opportunities to enjoy high-country hijinks.

Not to be outdone by Keystone, Vail has its own celebration, with the 31st season of the **Vail Dance Festival**; a full two weeks of movement and music. With dancers and troupes coming in from all over the world, you'll experience a range of styles and experiences, and even the chance for a bit of education, if you're so inclined. The Martha Graham dance company is among the featured performers, as is the American Ballet Theatre and renown choreographer Alonzo King.

And if you're deeper in the Rockies, **Jazz Aspen Snow-mass** is legendary, both for its stunning venues and the high-caliber talent making their music at high altitude. This year's luminaries include Sting, Weezer, H.E.R., Luke Combs, and Portugal. The Man, among others.

You say you still didn't get enough live bluegrass this summer? Don't fret (get it?), because the 29th Annual **Folks Festival** in Lyons, CO will fill your craving before the season winds down. This three-day event is bonkers, and the lineup this year is especially stellar. Ani DeFranco, St. Paul and the Broken Bones, Josh Ritter, Ben Folds, and even the legendary Violent Femmes will bluegrass your socks off (whether or not you're donning them with Birkenstocks).





The Cultural Connoisseur

Sometimes you want it all — the food, the music, the arts, the culture — in one place, with a chance to learn and grow. And maybe eat deep-fried food on a stick.

Mountain towns love their hot air balloon festivals — the cool, calm mornings and majestic vistas lend themselves to gorgeous flights and epic photos. Steamboat Springs hosts their 38th annual **Hot Air Balloon Rodeo** July 13-14, supported by Art in the Park when the morning flights are over. The **Snowmass Balloon Festival** is September 6-9, and with the main launch area on the golf course, catch mirror-image reflection photos as balloonists "splash and dash" through the water hazards, gently drifting their gondolas along the surface. You'll want to be on the field by dawn for these festivals, because hot air balloons are up and out early.

Saddle up to experience the wild west at Golden's **Buffalo Bill Days**, July 25-28. With the titular entertainer entombed just above the city (his grave is a popular tourist destination), the festival is a celebration of a time long gone. Enjoy their "Best of the West" parade, Cody's classic wild west show, "mutton bustin'" (where kids ride sheep bronco-style), and of course all the food and live music to go with it.

For even more western culture, visit **Leadville Boom Days** August 2-4. At two full miles above sea level, the historic mining town is a delight. Check out the parade, the Boom Days Car Show, mining competitions, and even an actual burro race!

The **Colorado Dragon Boat Festival** on the shores of Sloan's Lake in Denver is an annual favorite — a celebration of Asian and Asian-American heritage, complete with dragon boat races, an array of vendors in the Taste of Asia food court, performers on five stages, and an arts and culture marketplace. This year's highlighted country is Vietnam, so show up hungry.

If you want to high step to a celebration of Celtic culture, head up to Estes Park for the **Longs Peak Scottish Irish Highland Festival**, September 6-8. With Celtic music all weekend long, along with feats of strength and skill (jousting, dancing, even a strongman competition), this 40-year tradition is the largest of its kind in the country.

For something a little more informal, the **Union Station Buskerfest** (August 1-4) honors street performers and their particular skills and talents. Comedy, magic, fire dancers, an acrobatic street circus — artists travel from all over the world for the festival. It's also a celebration of Colorado Day —143 years and counting!

And the **Cheesman Park Art Fest** is consistently ranked as one of the top craft festivals in the nation, with 150 artists from around the country participating in the juried competition. Food trucks supply the snacks, while live bands supply the tunes. Cheesman Park is home to some of the oldest trees in the city, which means lots of gentle shade when you need it.

On September 7 and 8, just outside downtown Denver in the Belmar neighborhood, celebrate Italian culture with 10,000 of your fellow aficionados at the 15th annual **Festival Italiano**. And though the food is the star of the event, the live music and entertainment, activities and artisans make for a fun and festive couple of days.

Hungry for more culture? The **Denver International Festival** takes over Civic Center Park on August 3, and celebrates our global community through music, dance, food, and traditional art. It's a family-friendly all-day event, with dozens of food trucks, world music, and programs for kids.

We would be remiss if we failed to mention **PoloFest Denver 2019**. On August 31, participants will enjoy a day of entertainment and outdoor fun, amazing polo matches and great music. PoloFest benefits the Equine Partnership Program, which helps horses rehab from bad situations and helps children overcome trauma, neglect and abuse through the beautiful friendship and healing power of connecting with horses.

Now about that food on a stick. The **Colorado State Fair** runs August 23–Sept 2 in Pueblo, and it's a serious extravaganza. The Fairgrounds is transformed into a small city, with rodeos, a full-on carnival, live music (Hi, Beach Boys and 38 Special!), and livestock competitions each day. Get your fill of monster trucks, enjoy the demolition derby, catch some bronco bustin', or just wander the grounds with your deep-fried Twinkie and a cold beer. What could be better?

If you're venturing into the sun and fun of a Colorado festival, be sure to carry water with you, reapply sunscreen regularly, and keep your smile ready!

Tennessee Pass Yurts

here's something rejuvenating about getting away from the city and spending time in the outdoors. Breathing the clean air, taking in the view and connecting with nature can bring a much-needed sense of peace and perspective. And while pitching a tent or sleeping under the stars sounds romantic, camping isn't everyone's cup of tea.

That's why we love "glamping" — that playful portmanteau that evokes glamourized camping for an elevated outdoor lodging experience. Glamping can be the perfect way to spend time in the great outdoors without sacrificing your creature comforts.

When it comes to glamping, some people love a good yurt — a circular tent stretched around a wooden framework, inspired by traditional nomadic dwellings. Others swoon over stylish safari tents with fancy firepits and Turkish linens.

So, for your next adventure, consider venturing outside the hotel room and into the great wide open. There are many ways to get your glamping fix, and here are just a few of our favorites.

For those who enjoy fine dining off the grid ...

The Tennessee Pass Yurts maximize the cozy factor. Located in Eagle County just north of Leadville off Highway 24, Tennessee Pass offers a popular Nordic center in the winter and sunny mountain retreat in the summer. The **Tennessee Pass Sleep Yurts** make an excellent mountain getaway for up to six guests, with handcrafted log beds complete with soft linens and down comforters. A kitchenette with sink, single propane burner and fresh water comes stocked with complimentary coffee, hot chocolate, and cider — plus cookware for preparing a light meal.

However, it's best to leave the cooking to the professionals here, thanks to the off-the-grid dining experience at the Tennessee Pass Cookhouse. Make a reservation for dinner (\$89 per guest), Thursday-Sunday, seven nights a week in the winter, or book a lunch or dinner for a larger group. Once you park, you'll enjoy an easy one-mile hike to the cookhouse, then dine on Colorado Rack of Lamb, Oven Roasted Pheasant, or Grilled Elk Tenderloin under glowing lantern light. Sleep yurts are \$240/night. *Tennesseepass.com*

For those who like glamping paired with music ...

You've heard of Red Rocks — the world-renowned natural outdoor amphitheater carved from striking red rock formations in Morrison, Colorado. You may not know that you can eliminate the drive back to the city and continue the under-the-stars magic by camping in high-end tents nearby. Just about two miles away from the amphitheater, Red Rocks Glamping offers approximately 50 luxury tents during 30 nights throughout the summer — all coordinated with Red Rocks shows. Each tent comes with a queen bed, two twin beds, or four cots as well as pillows, comforters and towels. Book a tent online, park in the designated parking area and grill out with other glampers before hailing a rideshare to Red Rocks (usually less than \$10 one way). After the show, recount the concert experience under battery-operated tent lights or grab a hot shower at the campground's restroom facilities. There's even a central charging station to make sure your phone has plenty of juice to document the whole adventure on Instagram. Rates under \$200/night. redrocksglamping.com/

For those who seek a bit of wild Western charm ...

To take in the natural beauty of Colorado's extraordinary south-western region, check into **Dolores River Campground**. This charming campground on the outskirts of the San Juan National Forest offers plenty of choices when it comes to accommodations, including two private yurts overlooking the Dolores River, each with a private deck and fire pit. Inside, handcrafted wooden beds, table and chairs lend a rustic feel. Bring your own bedding or chip in \$20 extra for linens.

While the yurts provide a pleasant escape, the new covered wagon glamping experience offers something extra special. Introduced in 2018, these Conestoga wagons were handcrafted in Utah but destined for a true Colorado riverside experience. Pioneering guests will enjoy a king-size bed and bunk bed (linens included) in each of the two wagons, as well as a dining table and chairs, mini-refrigerator and microwave, and outdoor picnic table and firepit. Those lodging at the yurts and the wagons are invited to shower at the remodeled bathhouse, which was designed with beetle-kill pine, granite counters and flushing toilets as well as an outdoor dish-washing sink and two outdoor showers. Summer rates for the yurts are \$77/night; \$125/night for wagons. doloresrivercampground.com/

You don't need to book a high-end resort to enjoy the finer things in life. At Collective Vail of Collective Retreats, a glamping destination just north of I-70 at 4 Eagle Ranch in Wolcott, you'll enjoy a high-country getaway in high style. Choose between the Summit Tents and the Journey Tents, each of which offers plush bedding, Turkish towels, private flush toilets and hot running water. The Summit tents even feature ensuite bathrooms and spa showers. The creature comforts continue with a selection of coffee, tea, cocoa, and a hot water kettle in each tent, with options to order breakfast and a la carte lunch and dinner.

Of course, part of the fun of glamping is your proximity to nature. Here, guests enjoy onsite activities such as horseback riding, hiking and mountain biking (at an additional cost). Concierge service and daily housekeeping offer an upscale touch; the onsite winery doesn't hurt, either. This backcountry hut system in State Forest State Park is ideal for those who truly want to get away from civilization — not to mention electricity, running water and cell phone coverage. And yet, there's something special about escaping the everyday grind to simplify, slow down and soak in the wonder of nature. With more than 72,000 acres of land, State Forest State Park is a playground for everyone, from hikers to backcountry backpackers to ATVers.

There are several different options for yurt experiences with Never Summer Nordic, and the North Park Yurts, a division of Never Summer Nordic, are the most comfortable of the lot. With drive-up accessibility, solar-powered lighting, real queen beds and fully stocked cooking areas, these are perfect for first-timers. If a cabin for a crowd is more your style, book the Willow Lodge cabin on the same property, which sleeps up to 20 with eight queen-sized beds. 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Spirited Connection

Medium Rebecca Rosen Offers Comfort and Advice From the Departed



There are times when we just need to believe. Perhaps we've lost our way, we've reached a crossroads, or maybe we merely want to connect. We wait, we hope, we wonder. And then, unexpectedly, a sign. Seemingly insignificant on the surface, it may appear at a random moment. Nothing remarkable, maybe a smooth stone, a spider, flickering lights, a bird overhead. Take heed, because those subtle signs may well be a loved one trying to communicate with the living.

I had never given much thought to the spirit world, readily assuming that once people passed they were in another place that really had no bearing on my life. So when I sat in on a small group session with Rebecca Rosen, I had no expectations and certainly no preconceived ideas of what I was about to experience.

Rebecca Rosen is a medium; she communicates with the dead and brings relevance to the lives of the living. I lost my father (a wonderful, funny man devoted to family and golf) a couple years ago and was interested in learning whether she could provide some insight into how he was doing.

She began the group with everyone seated in a circle. She chanted a short meditation, encouraging us to connect our bodies to the earth and to open our minds. There are times in a group when no one is really being receptive and allowing spirits to communicate, she pointed out. If people are shut down and not willing to hear the spirits, then there's not going to be a lot of activity. Lucky for us, this group was ready to hear from loved ones and others who had departed.

Immediately upon beginning, Rosen heard from "Joe", (names have been changed for the sake of privacy). Joe was the husband of Lisa, who was seated next to me. Joe had died within the past year and clearly wanted to reach out to his wife. "There's someone who had a connection to a motorcycle," Rosen observed. Lisa teared up and acknowledged this was her husband. And from there it became even more interesting. "I have an overwhelming feeling of desperation to set the record straight. He wants me to tell you he's sorry. He's talking about your

daughters. Do you have a tattoo for him?" Rosen wondered. "I do," Lisa sobbed. "Now who's Jack?" "That's my dad and grandfather," said the man to my right (we'll call him Ron). "Was there a heart-related issue?" Rosen asked. Ron acknowledged his grandfather was afflicted. "Was he a strong catholic?" Rosen wondered. Ron answered affirmatively. "He's dressed like John Wayne," Rosen intoned. "He liked cowboys," Ron said. Spirits often appear in the form of their ideal, she explained.

The conversations continued, as Rosen bounced around the room, zeroing in on spirits and communicating their messages to the people in the group. It was interesting to watch people light up as she hit the mark, and then continued down a path of further exploration. Whether it was rocks as a sign (the woman in question held a stone in her lap and had a bag full of them that she randomly collected because "they called to me,") or a direct message to a loved one, Rosen's connections ran the gamut but in the end left everyone feeling empowered and positive. The takeaway: I went in a skeptic and walked out relieved and I'll admit happy to know my father is still enjoying himself, and hopefully getting in a few rounds of golf, wherever he is.

Rosen's calling as a spiritual medium became apparent when she was 20 years old and a student at the University of Florida. "Back home, my father had attempted suicide and my family was falling apart," she acknowledges. "I slipped into a depression and it manifested itself through an eating disorder, called sleep eating. Every night for over six months, I'd sleepwalk into the kitchen and start carb-loading until moments later I'd 'wake up' and realize what I was doing. I felt helpless and out of control. As I would cry myself back to sleep, I would pray and beg for someone or something to help me out of this dark night of the soul."

Not long after she began to pray, Rosen's deceased Grandma Babe and her guardian angel, Maya, took over her hand as she was journaling in a bookstore, "writing messages through me," a process she later discovered was automatic writing. "For over an hour they relayed helpful and healing words as I wrote furiously across the pages. Grandma Babe knew I was doubting the experience, so gave me a few details to run by my father to validate it was really her spirit I was channeling. Sure enough, my dad not only validated the information, but was blown away and encouraged me to continue connecting with her," Rosen recalls.

"Grandma Babe suffered from severe postpartum depression and took her own life when I was just 10 years old," she continues. "She said she was coming to me to help save me from going down the same dark road of depression. She asked me to work with her daily, along with my angel, to do the work on healing myself from the inside out. Eighteen months later I was healed and whole again."

It was these tools, passed on to Rosen, that served as the basis of her first book, *Spirited*, which she describes as part memoir, and part self-help for readers to learn to tap into their own innate intuitive gifts and work with their team in spirit.

Interestingly, Rosen traces her connection to the spirit world back to her childhood. "I grew up in a middle-class Jewish home and had a very typical childhood, lots of good friends and great memories of being a kid and teenager," she reflects. "I do recall having many conversations with my 'imaginary friends,' that I now know were not imaginary at all! These were spirits and angels that many young children can sense and see. And I remember just 'knowing' things, seeing the truth so clearly in any situation, often times leaving my parents speechless as to how I would know with such certainty. This was me tapping into my innate intuitive gift, something we all have to different degrees, and they can be especially strong in young children because our minds aren't talking ourselves out of it - we're just downloading truth as if it were fact."

Obviously, a gift such as Rosen's could easily be construed as a burden rather than a blessing. I asked her how she presents information that is bleak or upsetting. "At the beginning of a reading I pray and ask only what is highest and best for the individual, only information that is helpful or healing to come through," she explains. "So if something comes up that we might label as 'bad' or 'negative' I share it in a way that I'm guided, in a way they can best hear it. I remind them that if it's coming up, knowledge is power, and to use the information to either embrace the experience as a learning opportunity or change it. The future is not set in stone, and we have free will to make certain choices to alter the outcome. Knowing this, the guidance can be seen as empowering and helpful to the receiver.

Her openness to the spirit world made me wonder what happens when she visits a place that resonates with the departed, such as a cemetery. How do you cope with all the noise and how do you process all the emotions? I pressed. "While we don't have the power to control it – turn it off – we always have the choice to tune in to it or not. So in times where I don't want to tap into it, I simply tune it out," she explains.

As evidenced by the tears and relief that washed over the entire small group I experienced, Rosen's ability to communicate with the spirit world truly can be a gift to those in pain. I asked her what advice she offers someone who loses a loved one. "To know that while the physical loss is very painful and real, their spirit energy lives on in our hearts and we can access this eternal love connection to them by going within. Nobody is closer to their own inner guidance and connection to departed loved ones than you, and we can all tap into our intuitive gifts for ourselves. It simply requires making the time to be still and feel your way into this energy, while suspending doubt long enough to believe it is real."

Rosen recently released a new book, *Begin With Prayer and Meditation*, which many have used as a resource to begin their own healing process. "Everything we need to know lies within us. We all have a God Spark within that connects us to something bigger than ourselves and to each other," she explains. "And we all have the ability to talk with God/Source and Spirit (prayer) and to receive divine guidance and connection (meditation). There is no right or wrong way to do it, simply make time and space and go within and ask for what you want or need, then open your mind and heart to receive this download of divine energy, insight and guidance."

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
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

With its craggy peaks and lush valleys, Colorado is home to some amazing mountain golf courses with a view. Mountains, evergreen trees and immaculately manicured greens create a stunning backdrop at every hole of Beaver Creek Golf Club, a Robert Trent Jones, Jr. course boasting challenging fairways. Nearby, the Red Sky Ranch & Golf Club offers two championship courses designed by Greg Norman and Tom Fazio, where you're likely to spot deer, elk and many species of mountain birds (the two Red Sky courses are separated by a ridge that doubles as a wildlife migration corridor). Though both courses are semi-private, you can book a tee time when you stay at several nearby hotel partners, including The Westin Riverfront Resort & Spa in Avon, where you can unwind after a day on the links in the resort's award-winning 27,000-squarefoot Spa Anjali.

In Water or Offroad

This summer is expected to be one of the best whitewater rafting seasons on record, thanks to abundant snowfall over the winter. Enjoy a half-day of adventure on the Arkansas River with the experienced and knowledgeable guides at Raft Masters. You and your crew will enjoy the thrill of this adventurous trip famous for its steep drops, huge waves and action-packed rapids like Sunshine Falls, Sledge Hammer and Boat Eater. Looking for a fun and unique way to see the Royal Gorge? Colorado Jeep Tours offers half-day off-road jeep expeditions and full-day packages with other attractions, such as a ride on the Royal Gorge Route Railroad, wine tasting and more. And if you're headed to the Royal Gorge Bridge & Park, you'll save money by booking a Royal Gorge Jeep Tour that includes free Royal Gorge Bridge tickets. Best of all, the tours are both kid-friendly and dog-friendly!

Mountain Bike for the Views

Durango is a mountain biking mecca with more than 300 miles of trails within 30 minutes of downtown. Plus, it's a super-cool town with a laidback vibe and plenty to do after you hit the trails. Whether you're a novice or an extreme adventurer on two wheels, the Horse Gulch trail system offers a little something for every skill level. There are more than 57 miles of trails to choose from across 1,519 acres, so you can stay and play all day without getting bored. For a difficult but rewarding ride, also consider the Hogsback Trail, which gains nearly 700 feet in elevation in just 1.7 miles. The trail, which is part of the 300-acre Overend Mountain Park (an area locals call "Test Tracks"), offers a killer workout and sweeping panoramic views.

Hike the Maroon Bells

Though you've likely seen a photograph (or two!) of Colorado's famed Maroon Bells, you really need to see this gorgeous panorama in person — you'll see Maroon Peak and North Maroon Peak reflected in a clear blue mountain lake, flanked by stunning alpine meadows filled with trees. You can take a quick one-mile roundtrip hike along the Maroon Lake Scenic Trail, or take a longer jaunt on the 3.2-mile one-way Maroon Creek Trail or the 3.6-mile roundtrip Crater Lake Trail. The nearby Silver Bell campground offers 14 tent sites or, for a more luxurious base camp, check into Viceroy Snowmass, where you can soothe your tired muscles in the resort's three new outdoor soaking tubs, designed specifically to soothe your calves, quads and lower back. As an added bonus, the resort and the Maroon Bells trails are dog-friendly, so you can bring your four-legged friends along for the journey.

Ride Horses in the Mountains

You'll feel especially connected with nature when you experience Colorado's summer landscape on horseback. Even if you have no experience with these gentle beasts, you can still enjoy a relaxing ride through nature while listening to the gentle "clip-clop" of your horse's hooves hitting the trail. Though you may feel like a cowboy, you won't have to rough it at **Vista Verde Ranch** near Steamboat Springs. This luxury, all-inclusive dude ranch will pair you up with a horse for your entire stay, so you can really get to know each other during the resort's horsemanship clinics and daily trail rides (in the fall, you can even participate in a cattle round-up on horseback!). Plus, the ranch's "cowboy cuisine," gorgeous grounds and private cabins make this the ultimate Colorado retreat.

Fly Fish in a River

There's no question: fly fishing is challenging, particularly when you compare it to standard fishing. But it's also incredibly rewarding and a great way to explore Colorado's mountain rivers, creeks and lakes. If you don't know the first thing about tying flies or how to tell the difference between Colorado's various types of trout, never fear — there are plenty of local outfitters who can take you on your first fishing trip. For a more immersive experience, you'll want to check out The Broadmoor Fly Fishing Camp, a relaxing retreat along a private fivemile stretch of the Tarryall River. Each day, you'll head out on a guided fly-fishing excursion, punctuated by delicious meals and other activities, like hiking, stargazing and bird-watching in the 120,000 acres of wilderness. The camp also offers a daily fly-tying workshop each evening before you head back to your circa-1920s cabin.





Sure, swimming can be fun, but many of Colorado's lakes and reservoirs are fed by snowmelt, which means the water can be ice cold even at the end of summer. Another way to get out on the water? Standup paddleboarding, more commonly referred to as "SUP." You can SUP all over Colorado, including at many reservoirs and lakes within an hour's drive of Denver. But the state's beautiful mountain scenery is really on display at Dillon Reservoir, a 3,300-acre body of water located at 9,017 feet in elevation in Summit County. Head to Frisco Bay Marina, where you can rent a standup paddleboard and explore on your own or sign up for a guided tour or lesson. (If paddleboarding isn't your thing, they also rent canoes, kayaks,

Want a more leisurely bike riding experience? Hop on one of Hotel Teatro's vintage bikes and cruise around to Denver's best craft breweries. This boutique hotel even provides a brewery map curated by their in-house craft beer concierge, so you can sip all the best local sours, IPAs and porters during your ride. If you're in the mountains instead, hit up one of several bike rental shops in Glenwood Springs, then pedal your way along the 42-mile paved Rio Grande Trail. Stop for lunch in Carbondale, or continue all the way to Aspen. Just don't forget to pack sunscreen and lots of water, and be sure to save some energy for the ride back.

Rock Climb in the Garden of the Gods

Take your rock climbing experience to the next level with a visit to the Garden of the Gods. If you're an experienced climber, all you need is a free permit to explore these towering sandstone rock formations. Or, if you're new to the sport or just want someone else to take care of the details, you can book a guided ascent through **Front Range Climbing Co.**, which offers trips for climbers of all skill levels. After a day on the rocks, unwind with a therapeutic massage before retreating back to your private cottage at the nearby **Garden of the Gods Resort & Club.**

Trek with a Llama

Though multi-day backpacking trips are a great way to immerse yourself in nature, there's that pesky element of having to carry all your food, water and gear as you traipse through the backcountry (and no matter how light you try to pack, those backpacks get heavy). That's where llamas can help. These animals can help lighten your load by carrying some of your gear. Explore the wildflowers of the San Juan Mountains during a guided summer llama trip with **Redwood Llamas**, based in Silverton. You'll spend four or five days on the trail, eating "backcountry gourmet" food and camping under the stars. If you have experience, you can even lease a llama and set off to explore on your own.

SUP Yoga




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20 Iconic Years
