A Perfect Pair: Technology & the In-Person Experience

How Tech and Face-to-Face Connections Provide the Best of Both Worlds By Kelli Williams, LIV Sotheby's International Realty

hile online accessibility at our fingertips makes today's world a breeze, there is still a need for personal connections and relationships. LeMasters does believe that some interactions will be replaced by technology, with an example being some of Amazon's offerings for online commodities. As another example, grocery stores may implement some further automatic options – King Soopers is currently offering a "Scan, Bag, Go" option in some of the locations where you can scan your groceries while you shop and check out without having to wait in line. 

The Genius of Leonardo da Vinci on Display at Denver Museum of Nature & Science





he brilliance of Leonardo da Vinci is revealed in a stunning exhibit, *Leonardo da Vinci: 500 Years of Genius.* The fascinating experience, housed at the Denver Museum of Nature & Science, features nearly 70 of the great inventor's machines, built using detailed concepts from his famous codices, including a helicopter, airplane, automobile, submarine and military tank.

On display is the exclusive "The Secrets of Mona Lisa," an analysis of the iconic painting conducted at the Louvre by scientific engineer and photographer Pascal Cotte.

A particular highlight is the Grande Exhibitions' SENSORY4 technology, a multisensory cinematic experience of Leonardo's work.

The exhibit represents a collaboration between Grande Exhibitions of Australia and the Museo Leonardo da Vinci in Rome, as well as experts from Italy and France, who used Leonardo's detailed drawings and notes to build his machine inventions. Some are scaled down, some are life-sized, and others are oversized.

To construct parts of the exhibit, artisans "had to learn an old Florentine dialect, interpret Leonardo's shorthand and mirror writing, and analyze his intricate drawings, sometimes laboring through page upon page of drawings of the same invention as Leonardo strove for perfection," according to Grande Exhibitions. "They have scoured 6,000 pages of notes to decipher the 'patents' Leonardo put in his work – deliberate mistakes, misleading information, and scattered ideas." The result is nearly 70 machine inventions that were brought to life using the materials and techniques of 15th Century Italy, some with mechanisms that visitors can actually try out.

Start Making Sense!

Also opening this month at the Denver Museum of Nature & Science is a playful new exhibition, "Our Senses: Creating Your Reality."

Fun for the whole family, you will play with color, patterns, sounds, scents and textures to discover there's much more to human senses than just the famous five.

The journey is a true sensory experience, as you begin to realize that what you perceive is not exactly what's actually taking place around you. In one gallery, discover what happens when your senses disagree: though your feet will feel a flat floor beneath you, your eyes will see walls and a floor that appear to curve and ripple. Experience how to hunt like a snake to find prey using an infrared viewer, or use a sensor to challenge a computer's ability to learn.





ating in Colorado is a traveler's treat, with a wide range of restaurants, pop-ups, bars serving tasty bites, food halls, and even quick-service spots focusing on locally sourced menu items and creative concoctions. It can be an intimate look into the inner workings of a kitchen, the chance to see how much effort and care goes into every dish, and a rare opportunity to chat with the passionate people behind the scenes.

The chef's table at **Frasca Food and Wine** is plunked down right inside the famous Boulder kitchen, tucked just out of the way of the servers zipping in and out, close enough to hear the orders called and received and to watch as the team seems to effortlessly serve up some of the best food in the nation. You might chat with co-owner and James Beard award-winning Master Sommelier Bobby Stuckey about your choice of wines, or maybe one of the executive chefs will stop by to share the inspiration for the pasta dish he or she just put in front of you. Frasca's "Quatro Piatti" menu is a four-course prix-fixe wonder, but you'll want to add in an appetizer or two and pair it all from the vast Italian wine list. The chef's table experience is intimate, exclusive, and unforgettable.

The entire restaurant is a chef's counter at **Beckon** in the RiNo Art District of Denver. With only 18 seats in the whole place, formed in a U-shape around the open preparation area, you'll want to purchase your tickets the moment they're released at the beginning of each month. The multi-course tasting menu, largely influenced by Scandinavian flavors, changes based on seasonal ingredients available. You'll never have the exact same meal twice. Opt for the wine pairing, but be sure to try one of their inventive and well-balanced cocktails before the first dish arrives. Each small plate builds on the previous one, meticulously formulated for a magical mix of flavors.

For super-intimate dining, visit **The Bindery's** website to enter the lottery for a spot at their chef's table, which has a mere four seats available, right in the middle of the open kitchen, one night per week. The all-inclusive, seven-course tasting menu with wine pairings is curated specifically for the evening, with award-winning chef Linda Hampsten Fox (see page 43 for more) and her team each presenting a unique dish. Each chef brings a different approach to the table, including the uber-talented pastry crew. Entries are selected at random, and winners are notified two weeks before the dinner for confirmation.

Put a Steak In It

When it comes to beef, Colorado's steakhouses are unparalleled. Our meat mavens know their craft, and you can find a perfectly prepared steak on just about every menu in Denver, in the mountains, and even on the plains. But if you're looking for the true carnivore's experience, several restaurants offer tastings that show off the differences between aging, cuts, feed, and more.

At **Urban Farmer** in downtown Denver, the menu developed by Chef Chris Starkus is so local, some of the ingredients come from right there in the restaurant. Urban Farmer grows their own mushrooms (be sure to order the tableside sauté), sources honey from the hives on the roof of the building, and uses produce from the chef's own farm south of Denver. You won't want to miss out on the dryaged foie gras torchon, but the star of the menu is the New York Steak Tasting, which features 6-oz. slabs of sliced beef — grass-fed, grain-finished, 21-day dry aged, and 7x Colorado wagyu — to try side by side. Really want to elevate the experience? The sommelier will pair each type of steak with a different red wine for you to sip between bites. If all the meat and mushrooms aren't decadent enough, Urban Farmer's desserts (including honeycomb from upstairs brought down to scoop out in front of you) are absurdly delicious.



Citizen Rail's location on the first floor of Kimpton's Hotel Born at Union Station allows for a different kind of steak-centered celebration. Their "Taste of the Born" experience includes a night at the hotel, where the plush rooms offer views of Denver in all directions and an introduction to the restaurant's dry aging room from Chef Christian Graves himself. You'll want to sit at the chef's counter so you can watch the line at work in front of the wood-fired grill while you eat your three-course meal, which includes a side-by-side tasting of dry-aged vs. unaged New York steak. Be sure to order the Plunder Road cocktail, with the perfect balance of mezcal, clarified milk, chartreuse, and cantaloupe. It's an unexpected delight. After dinner, cozy up in your room upstairs, or hop across the way to **Tavernetta** or the **Cooper Lounge** for a nightcap.

Eating beef at **Corrida** is a totally different situation. This Spanish steakhouse in Boulder is all about variety. From Colorado wagyu to a 45-day dry-aged angus tomahawk to Miyazaki eye of ribeye, you'll get the meat sweats just looking at the menu. But don't forget to go beyond the beef and try Basque-inspired dishes like a salt cod brandade or the oysters with gazpacho gelée. Maybe start with their cured meats and Spanish cheeses while you await the gin-and-tonic cart, and ask the tender to make recommendations on which tonic water will go best with the gin of your choice. If the weather is lovely, sit on the balcony and enjoy one of the most dramatic rooftop views in the city.

Dinner and a Show

Sure, sure, a fancy dinner is special, but sometimes you want the whole evening to be a study in spectacle.

At **Nocturne**, a jazz restaurant and club in Denver, you can dine while enjoying the stylings of whichever brilliant band is playing on the stage. Order dish by dish, or surrender to the "Renditions" tasting menu, a five-course journey inspired by an iconic jazz album.

As co-owner Nicole Mattson puts it, "The chef and culinary team listen to the album and research the importance of each song for inspiration to create a dish. Sometimes the rhythms of the drums remind the chef of the sound of the whisk in a bowl or sometimes the location of where the song was written inspires a regional flavor to be incorporated into the dish."

If you're fortunate enough to get a reservation on the evening of the new menu launch (which happens every two to three months), a band plays each song from the album while the dishes are delivered to the tables. The sommelier explains the wine pairings and the chef shares his inspiration for each plate.

"It's an exclusive one-night event that is part Ted-Talk, part Chef's table, part concert," says Mattson. The tasting menu is available for a few weeks after the launch.

If you're up in the mountains, you may be interested in another kind of show. Getting up to **Game Creek Restaurant** in the back bowls of Vail Mountain is a special experience in its own right. Start off on the Lionshead Eagle Bahn Gondola (cozy blankets provided for the chilly trip up), and then, depending on the season, ride a snowcat or a four-wheel drive shuttle to the lodge. The place has a classic Tyrolean feel, but the food is anything but stuffy. Choose between the four-course menu or five-course sequenced chef's table experience. And then ride back down full of food and smiles.

Beano's Cabin up at the top of Beaver Creek is the more rustic sister restaurant, and you get there via an open-air sleigh ride in the winter. The five-course menu is full of Colorado favorites, like striped bass and roasted venison.

If food with a view is your kind of thing, make your way up to the world-famous **Flagstaff House**, founded back in 1971. The epic indoor and outdoor dining area overlooking the city of Boulder has breathtaking views that deepen and change as the sun goes down behind the mountains. But the Flagstaff House is more than a pretty spot — the menu, wine pairings, and service are as elevated as the restaurant. The multicourse chef's tasting offers plate after plate of balanced perfection, from an oyster amuse bouche to venison tenderloin. The restaurant earned its *Forbes Travel Guide* Four Star status for the 41st year in a row, and it shows. Be sure to order the flaming s'mores decadence for dessert. You won't be disappointed.

Chef's Choice

Speaking of letting the chef do the curating, you may be surprised to find out that Colorado is home to fresh and delicious sushi and other Japanese dishes. And when you really want to enjoy the best a sushi restaurant has to offer, omakase (chef's choice), is always the way to go.

Nobu **Matsuhisa's** namesake restaurants in Denver, Vail, and Aspen offer an omakase that includes way more than a few bites of fresh fish. You'll start off with the raw goodness of three signature delights — maybe it'll be fatty tuna tartare with white sturgeon caviar on top, followed by lightly seasoned slices of sashimi, and then a three-nigiri sampler, with a cold, fresh salad variation after that. From there, you'll dive into two main dishes, like their umami-cured seabass and a perfectly cooked lamb lollipop (a personal favorite). A soup course (emulsified foie miso soup, anyone?) and a delicate dessert dish finish you off for real.

For an exclusive chef's choice experience over in LoHi, look into the "Segretto Room" at **Bar Dough**. This secret space fits up to 10 guests and includes a "chef-curated" dining experience, with wine or cocktail pairings to match the meal. If you're a fan of Chef Carrie Baird, who was in the final four on Top Chef and a fan favorite (see page 40 for more about Carrie), you'll want to reserve this space so she and her team can put together an unforgettable meal for you and your closest friends.

For one of the most fresh and mind-blowing chef's tasting menus you find anywhere, visit Black Cat in Boulder. With the majority of its ingredients sourced from Chef Eric Skokan's own certified organic and biodynamic 130-acre Black Cat Farm just outside the city, the menu changes constantly. This isn't one of those tasting menus where you'll still be hungry for a cheeseburger at the end of the evening. Each wholesome and hearty dish builds on the one before it, with seasonal flavors masterfully layered one on top of the other. Choose the premium wine pairing if you're up for tasting a range of unique and whimsical varietals the sommelier selects specifically for each dish, working closely with the kitchen team for the perfect match or counterpoint. Black Cat's cozy and intimate space, with its sofa booths and homey throw pillows is warm and inviting. Be sure to check their website for special farm dinners in the spring and summer!

Whether you're looking for the finest steak dinner, an intimate or private dining experience, or just an allaround special evening out, Colorado's chefs are ready to treat you to something truly memorable and delicious.

Big Bites on a Budget Eating well doesn't have to break the bank

ometimes the best dish you'll have when traveling is the one for which you paid the least amount of cash. It might come from a street food vendor who just happens to be open at the moment you pass by, or a tiny local restaurant right next to your hotel. Or it's 2 a.m. and you've just left your third bar, and you're looking for something delicious to soak up that last cocktail before you head back to the hotel. These spots might be inexpensive, but the ingredients are fresh, probably locally sourced, and you won't be hungry when you're done.

The Go-To

From quick-serve to a seated dinner, Colorado's Mexican restaurants are where you can fill up on hearty comfort food for just a few bucks. One quick rundown couldn't do justice to the number of spots where you can indulge in the perfect carne asada (ask any local and you'll get a different answer), but these are a few local faves:

El Corazon — This downtown stalwart has served many a famished family over the years. Their mole is particularly special. El Taco de Mexico – Family-owned like many on this list, and an essential stop when visiting the galleries of the Santa Fe

Arts District.

Little Anita's – A regional chain, arguably best-known for their breakfast burrito.

Los Carboncito's — People will drive out of their way for the lengua.

Mexico City Lounge – Tacos, tacos, tacos!

Torta Grill — The fresh bread and hot and melty insides make these tortas unforgettable.

Quick and Messy

Sometimes, you just need a slab o' meat between slices of bread to get you through. These spots have that and more.

Ballpark Vienna Beef — The perfect stop on your way to or from a Colorado Rockies game at Coors Field. Grab the Chicago Dog + Italian Beef special for heart-stopping goodness.

Biker Jim's Gourmet Dogs — Surprise yourself with a rattlesnake & pheasant dog or Alaskan reindeer, or just go for the Angus all-beef. Whatever you do, order crispy onions on top.

Crown Burger – Believe it or not, you can get four BLTs or perfectly greasy burgers for just \$10.

Illegal Pete's — Legendary, enormous burritos nearly bursting with fresh ingredients, open all day and late into the night.

Masterpiece Deli — A LoHi sandwich staple from master chef Justin Brunson. Sure, you could go with the healthy and delicious seared tuna on an English muffin, but the Reuben special is the real winner.

Fast and Healthy

Sometimes you crave a nutritious, still-delicious, and inexpensive meal, but need more than a salad to get you through.

- **Biju's Little Curry Shop** Inspired by southern Indian cuisine, with scratch-made dishes that'll warm your soul. Order some chili lime tots to go with your curry bowl.
- Kokoro Japanese fast food couldn't be more delicious. Try the beef curry, opt for "sobaghetti" or tempura udon, or just fill up on tasty gyoza. This family-friendly restaurant has been serving up healthy bowls of happiness in Denver for more than 30 years.
- Ohana Kitchen The OG of poke spots in Denver, this little oasis of Hawaiian delight is not to be missed.
- Maria Empanada When owner Lorena Cantarovici started baking out of her garage, she probably had no idea her pockets of Argentinian goodness would become a Denver institution. Now she has five locations and more on the way.

Sit, Stay

A sit-down meal doesn't have to max out your credit card. But it might just fill your belly.

- 20th Street Café The classic downtown fixture isn't fancy in the least, but that doesn't mean you should skip out on their breakfast fried rice.
- Bonnie Brae Tavern Founded in 1934, this neighborhood spot is probably bestknown for Mike's Cheeseburger Pizza, with ground beef, mozzarella (or American cheese), pickles, and onions.
- **Dead Battery Club** Enjoy affordable cocktails and a range of fresh baked buns while you kick back in this stylish little spot.
- Interstate Kitchen and Bar Settle in for one of the best burgers (Angus or vegan!), or their eight-hour roast beef sandwich with horseradish cream. Don't miss the best French fries in Denver.

Right to your Door

Sometimes, you just want to eat in the comfort of your pjs, and have hot food other than pizza delivered when you want it, pants optional.

Boney's BBQ — Get extra saucy, knowing you can jump right in the shower once you've put away all the brisket and burnt ends!

Daikon — Order yourself a fresh and fabulous banh mi sandwich on a fresh baguette. **Melita's Greek Café** — Old school charm and gyros for all!

- Peter's Chinese Small and mighty, this place has the best scallion pancakes and perfect sesame chicken. Peter himself may be the one to answer the phone when you call and order.
- Shish Kabob Grill Located just on the edge of downtown, with big platters of Middle Eastern comfort food. Don't forget to order extra hummus.

Hot Noods

Just need an inexpensive bowl of carb comfort? They're easy to find all over Denver.

- Menya Whether you visit the noodle bar on the 16th Street Mall or their ramen and poke spot a quick walk over the Millennium Bridge, you'll be quite sated by the outcome.
- Sakura House A classic Japanese noodle house in Sakura Square, which is our own mini Japantown.
- What the Pho Easy downtown access to hot bowls with lots of broth and noodles.
- Zoe Ma Ma Union Station's quick-serve Chinese spot serves up a duck noodle wanton soup on Fridays and Saturdays, and their noodle soups are everything.

Denver Ted's – Nothing like a late-night cheesesteak to set you up for a good sleep.


- Famous Original J's Pizza Josh Pollack, the genie behind Rosenberg's Bagels & Delicatessen opened this New York-style haven at the back of the 715 Club in Five Points. Slices so fresh, thin, and hot, you can fold them in half.
- My Brother's Bar The oldest bar in Denver was a regular hangout for Neal Cassady and the Beat Generation. Get yourself a Jalapeño Cream Cheese Burger (JCB) and a fries and rings combo to share until way late.
- **Pony Up** If you're downtown and all you crave is a French dip sandwich, stop here and select from a menu full of variations, and order a cocktail from some of the sweetest bartenders in the city.
- **Sputnik** An old-school bar with unexpected dishes and a killer vegan menu. This is where you go after a night of live music along South Broadway, or when you want a PBR and something tasty for lunch.
- **There** The kitchen is open late and the steamed buns are delicious.

Mountain Moneysavers

A stop for food on the way to the resorts (or a break from the fancy) doesn't have to empty your wallet if you know where to look.

Moe's Original Bar B Que – Delicious and affordable at any of their locations, but the one in Vail is right near the gondola at Lionshead, which means a beer and brisket are close at hand.

- Local Joe's Pizza Another Vail go-to. Nothing too fancy here, just kick-ass pies served late (and even delivered!).
- Loaded Joe's Avon's secret weapon just down the way from Beaver Creek serves up lamb and eggs for breakfast and live music for dinner.
- Blue Coyote You'll want to "Gnar to the 'yote" for margs and tacos after a day on the mountain. Right in Beaver Creek.
- Fatbelly Burgers Stop by this Carbondale gem on the way to Aspen for grass-fed goodness that's locally sourced and always on point.



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chefs to watch

The Colorado chefs you need to know right now

any chefs and diners agree that Denver is experiencing something of a renaissance. More and more, our locally owned and operated restaurants are scooping up critical acclaim and national accolades. The scene is hot right now, and we all want a bite.

Of course, there are many humble hands behind the food we enjoy. While some of these chefs have earned household name recognition over the years, others are just starting to bring their presence to the table in Colorado.

For this story, we considered the chefs in Denver who are currently making the biggest impact on the culinary scene. The names that came to us first — Caroline, Dana, Carrie, Linda — all happened to belong to chefs who were female. We decided to make that the theme for this piece. And since we're going to press during Women's History Month, it just feels right.

It's important to note, though, that these chefs are *chefs* first — not just *women chefs*, but trained, talented and tenacious professionals whose presence in the Colorado dining scene is not only qualified but compelling. These chefs are leading Colorado's culinary evolution. In short, they're the ones to watch.



Jennifer Jasinski

Perhaps the best-known name in the context of Colorado cuisine is **Jennifer Jasinski**, proprietor of five restaurants, a James Beard Foundation award recipient and bearer of the well-deserved reputation as "the godmother" of Denver dining. Her first restaurant, Rioja, has been a pillar of Larimer Square since 2005, and the precursor to sister restaurants Bistro Vendôme, Euclid Hall, Stoic & Genuine and Ultreia. Her restaurants attract tourists and locals alike to Denver's most iconic downtown destinations for high-quality Mediterranean food, French bistro fare, hearty poutine, impossibly fresh seafood and award-winning burgers.

As Jasinski built her career, aspiring young chefs also found their way into her kitchens. In addition to her own accolades, Jasinski finds immense reward in helping others achieve success. "I love teaching people and I love surrounding myself with smart people," Jasinski says. "Smart people eventually move on, so this seems natural. I will feel honored to have helped people find and achieve their dream in the culinary world."

Another chef whose achievements have been top of mind lately is **Carrie Baird**, executive chef and partner at Bar Dough, and much-adored contestant on "Top Chef" season 15. Working alongside her restaurant group partners — including celebrated Denver chef, Max Mackissock — Baird oversees a menu of elevated Italian eats, including wood-fired pizzas and creative fresh pasta plus a brunch menu that includes five different fan-favorite Fancy Toasts. At Bar Dough, Baird works closely with senior sous chef Stefy DeVita and pastry chef Natalia Spampinato — two up-and-comers whose names you'll want to remember. Baird's top-notch team, affable nature and, of course, Fancy Toast, have helped land Bar Dough among Denver's best restaurants ever since it opened.

Baird, who was born in Idaho and once had hopes of becoming a professional skier, came to Colorado to chase the powder in Summit County. She lived in Breckenridge for 12 years before earning her degree at Le Cordon Bleu in Portland, Oregon. She returned to Colorado and eventually found herself working under Jasinski, whom she considers a mentor and a friend, and who inspired her to mentor others. "That's what I want my legacy to be," Baird says, "that I turned out some amazing chefs." Jasinski had a similar influence on **Dana Rodriguez**, executive chef and owner of restaurants Work & Class and Super Mega Bien. Also a James Beard Award winner, Rodriguez never anticipated a career as a chef. "I had been a butcher with my dad since I grew up on a farm," she says. "I never thought I'd be cooking at all." While visiting Denver in 1988, Rodriguez applied for a role at the Hotel Monaco. She didn't speak English at the time, but she was hired at Panzano, where she later worked with Jasinski. "Jen pushed me to do everything," Rodriguez says. "Prepping, pizza, banquets, pastry department, everything." Rodriguez eventually left Panzano to join Jasinski as the chef de cuisine at Rioja.

Today, Rodriguez owns and operates Work & Class and Super Mega Bien with partners Tony Maciag and Tabatha Knop, where the most important thing is taking care of their employees. More restaurants may be in the works, she says, and we can bet they'll be serving plenty of quality meals, stiff drinks and heartfelt hospitality.

These are all familiar terms for **Elise Wiggins**. "Hospitality comes naturally to me because I'm a southern gal," she says, although she's lived in Denver long enough to feel like family. And that's just how she treats her guests at Cattivella, which opened in 2017 in Stapleton. The lively Italian restaurant personifies Wiggins' 30 years of collective front- and back-of-house restaurant experience — including 12 years as executive chef at Panzano — with a genuinely warm welcome and commitment to making a lasting connection with guests.

Wiggins shares her deep love of cooking through handmade pasta, wood-fired pizzas and popular twice-monthly cooking classes. "I know how to break it down where it's not intimidating," she says, connecting with and nurturing new and repeat guests. "At the end of the class, these people are now part of my Cattivella family."

Not far from Cattivella, another chef makes a point to connect with guests from her open kitchen vantage point. "I talk to most guests who dine with us, and I love that," says founder and chef **Caroline Glover** of Annette, an intimate yet airy restaurant tucked within Aurora's Stanley Marketplace. In just two and a half years, Annette has been named one of the "50 Best New Restaurants in the Country" by *Bon Appetit* Magazine and was a 2018 James Beard Foundation award finalist. At press time, Glover had just been nominated again for Best Chef: Southwest.

Annette's menu, while featuring popular staples like octopus patatas bravas and roasted whole fish, is "always evolving, changing with the seasons, changing to reflect the produce that local farmers are giving us, or changing to make sure the kitchen and the bar are cross-utilizing ingredients," Glover explains. This type of approach is especially important to Glover, who went from working as a sous chef in New York to working on farms around the country before opening Annette just outside Denver. "Farming has made me much more aware of what it took to grow the food we cook with," she says. "and much more determined to honor that effort as best I can."

This spring, Annette will serve ramp and radish toast, asparagus and burrata salad, and milk-braised pork cheeks, among other seasonal dishes. But save room, Glover says, for the chamomile pot de creme with spring strawberries.

Sheila Lucero, the executive chef of Jax Fish House, harbors a similar dedication to food sourcing — only her supply comes from the ocean.

During her 21 years with Big Red F restaurant group, Lucero has been instrumental in designating Jax Fish House as the first restaurant in Colorado to be certified by the Monterey Bay Seafood Watch — the authority on respecting and maintaining sustainable fisheries. "It's a lot of work to do that homework," Lucero says, "But we've always been doing it, and it feels good to be aligned with them in our sustainability goals."

Caroline Glover

Lucero graduated from the Art Institute of Colorado and started her career as a line cook while still in school. Today, she oversees four Jax Fish Houses in Colorado and one in Kansas City, as well as Denver's longstanding Lola Coastal Mexican. "I try to lead by example," she says. "I feel so fortunate that I'm doing what I love. All the crazy shifts and long hours glide by because I love what I'm doing." This fall, another Jax will splash into Denver International Airport. And as you order your fresh oysters and hamachi crudo, you'll be doing your part to contribute to oceanic sustainability.

Another chef on our list, **Linda Hampsten Fox**, is so devoted to sustainable living that she lists her water-efficient dishwasher on the back of her menu at The Bindery. "It became a high priority for me to go into the space with eyes on sustainability," she says. From the energy-efficient radiant floor heating system to the Moroccan tadilakt wall tiles, to the wall insulation made from recycled denim jeans, Hampsten Fox is walking the walk. She's even planning to start a pilot composting program which she hopes will eventually reach other Denver restaurants.

Hampsten Fox first visited Colorado at age 16 while on a road trip from her family home in New Jersey, and immediately felt at home in Colorado. Following deep interests in art and food, she spent years learning and teaching cooking in Europe and Mexico before coming back to Colorado, knowing it would be where she opened her first restaurant as soon as the time was right.

The timing, as it turned out, was perfect. The Bindery has earned readers' choice awards for restaurant of the year in *Eater* and 5280 magazine. The enormous space and open kitchen grant guests a chance to witness her spellbinding craft in motion at just about any time of day. Guests swoon over her handmade pastries and breakfast menu each morning, seasonal and thoughtfully prepared shared plates at happy hour, and exquisite dinners worth lingering over. "We're doing everything from scratch," she says. "We're making everything the way that I learned and love from my family, to my time abroad, to the places I've traveled."

Like Hampsten Fox, **Kelly Jeun** lived and worked in Italy until just recently when she and her partner Eduardo Valle Lobo were hired to run the kitchen as co-executive chefs at Frasca Food and Wine in Boulder. Consistently ranked among Colorado's finest restaurants, Frasca is one of the country's best expressions of Northern Italian food — specifically that of a region known as Friuli-Venezia Giulia.

Jeun dreamed of cooking professionally ever since watching Lidia Bastianich on PBS. "She has such natural ease when cooking, and she always showcased simplicity and authenticity about Italian food," Jeun recalls. Her dream came true when she had the opportunity to work as a culinary assistant on Bastianich's Emmy-award winning cooking program, and again when she was invited to open Bastianich's restaurant, Orsone, in Cividale del Friuli.

"Colorado is similar in some aspects to Friuli," she says. "There are some great restaurants in the area, and we have certainly met a lot of transplants from big cities, so I believe the appetite and appreciation for great food is out there." Truly, chefs like Jeun are raising the standard in Colorado.

Frasca has cultivated several noteworthy chefs over the years. Among them, **Kodi Simkins**, Frasca's former chef de cuisine. But her kitchen skills took hold at a young age. "I come from a family with great cooks," she says. "Our family gathers as much as possible and we always use food as the centerpiece."

Simkins attended culinary school and started her career at Fruition, where she worked her way up to a sous chef within three years. She credits Alex Seidel, Matt Vater and Franco Ruiz for "teaching [her] how to cook, push, love, learn and succeed." She later earned her role at Frasca Food and Wine. "My years at Frasca helped me fine tune everything," she says.

Today, Simkins is part of the culinary team at The Wolf's Tailor, a 50-seat restaurant pushing boundaries of food and flavor. Simkins suggests ordering a few items from each section — or better yet, putting your fate in her hands with the "Entrust" chefs tasting experience, which curates the best expression of that day's Italian- and Asian-influenced menu. "Restaurants get categorized but it's hard for us to be grouped with others," Simkins says. "I would rather make great food that I enjoy than to fit in a specific category."

Indeed, ambitious chefs like Simkins are hard to put in a box — not unlike pastry chef **Liliana Myers**, who sees her work as a combination of art and science. "We used to call it the Da Vinci effect in college," she says. "A harmony of both science and art."

Myers' experience cooking in Michelin-starred restaurants in France and New York taught her resilience and empathy in the kitchen, as well as how to trust herself. "It was such a great experience to know that the only limits to what you can do are in your mind."

Now at Safta (by James Beard award-winner Alon Shaya), Myers is excited to explore her own cultural heritage through Israeli recipes. For her, this involves less French butter and more olive, "which is a bit cleaner on the palate as well as more locally sustainable," she explains. "Israel is such a diverse melting pot culture and at six months [at Safta] I think I am only beginning to scratch the surface."

When you visit Safta — no doubt for the famous hummus and pita — be sure to try the *malabi*, an Israeli milk pudding which Myers will make with local rhubarb and orchid root this spring. She's also working on a version of *krembo* an Israeli cookie with marshmallow topping, and her favorite childhood treat — which will feature the flavors of pistachio, rose and Meyer lemon.

According to Carrie Baird, Jasinski once told her that when it comes to being a chef, "food is the easy part." The rest — the long hours, the razor-thin margins, the challenge to build menus that will delight guests again and again — is what makes the industry so utterly demanding. But if we know anything about these chefs, they're up for it. They're made for it. Because wrapped tightly within that life is incredible growth, profound reward.

And as for us? You can bet that we'll keep coming back for more. \Box

Beautiful Waterfall Hikes of Colorado

Bridal Veil Falls

here is nothing more wondrous than a springtime hike in Colorado. Unless of course, that lush and woody hike leads to one of Colorado's glorious waterfalls, which spill over a mountainside and cascade into a beautiful stream or lake. Here are some don't-miss trails that will lead you to one of these beautiful sites. Don't forget the camera!

South Mineral Creek Falls

Location: Near Durango and Silverton

Departing from the South Mineral Creek Campground, hikers will trace South Fork Mineral Creek on the way to these falls, which flow into an ethereal turquoise pool, with red and grey peaks standing sentinel in the distance.

Seven Falls

Location: Near Colorado Springs

Trek up 224 steps alongside the Seven Falls (or take the in-mountain elevator), which tumble 181 feet down the canyon in seven distinct segments. Nature trails and views of Colorado Springs and the sprawlinwg Great Plains to the east add to the drama.

Bridal Veil Falls

Location: Near Telluride

Located 365 feet above the picturesque town of Telluride, which is nestled at the foot of a box canyon, the white spray of Colorado's tallest waterfall plummets to the canyon's depths, adding the final touch to a breathtaking scene.

Helen Hunt Falls


Location: Near Colorado Springs

These photo-worthy falls are situated in North Cheyenne Cañon Park, and are accessible by a steep but manageable hike amid spectacular views. The visitor center provides information on the area and the falls' geology.

Fish Creek Falls

Location: Near Steamboat Springs

Gorgeous any time of year, these falls are portrayed best in the spring. When temperatures rise and the snowmelt reaches its peak and winds its way downhill, water whooshes over Fish Creek's cliff, emitting a thunderous sound and a gentle spray that lightly cools hikers who have made the trek.





North Clear Creek Falls

Location: Near Lake City

For a hidden treasure along the Silver Thread Scenic Byway, look carefully for Forest Road 510 on your left, just past Spring Creek Pass. A short distance down the road you will be rewarded with views of gushing North Clear Creek Falls as it plummets from a willow-covered bench into a box canyon.

Zapata Falls

Location: Near Alamosa

As hikers approach the Zapata Falls along a windy trail at the base of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains on the way to Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve, it feels almost as if they're chasing the falls – they hear the roar of the 40-foot-tall gusher and feel its cooling effect long before they can actually see it.

Box Canyon Falls

Location: Near Ouray

Tucked in a narrow Ouray box canyon, the falls' 280-foot cascade can be experienced top to bottom via a staircase, hiking trail and suspension bridge. As thousands of gallons of water rush and roar its way down, take a moment to look up – the National Audubon Society has named the area an important bird site.

Ouzel Falls

Location: Near Estes Park

On the path to Ouzel Falls inside Rocky Mountain National Park, in one of the most green and lush spots in Colorado, hikers encounter several smaller falls and cascades that encourage them to continue toward the mother lode. Breathtaking Ouzel drops more than 40 feet through a sliver in the dark rock wall surrounding it and flows into a chilly pool filled with boulders and fallen trees. Also check out the park's Columbine Falls near Chasm Lake, with a great view of Longs Peak in the distance.

Rifle Falls State Park

Location: Near Rifle

On a warm summer day, the mist that drifts from the exhilarating gush of water over the 70-foot limestone cliffs and the dark caves below them in Rifle Falls State Park are a sight to behold.

Hanging Lake

Location: Glenwood Springs

Appearing to cling to the edge of a mountainside, the almost supernaturally teal-green Hanging Lake is surrounded by moss-covered rocks and a meandering trail. Waterfalls cascade quietly off a cliff into the lake's still depths, adding to an already surreal atmosphere.

ikaela Shiffrin considers herself an introvert. No matter how many races she wins, season titles she sweeps, Olympic or World Championship medals she collects, the 24-year-old Vail native never assumes any victory is in the bag.

This season was her most successful to date. She left the rest of the world's top skiers far, far behind in clinching her third straight World Cup overall title. She also landed her fourth straight World Championship slalom gold and - newly added to her repertoire - proved herself a paramount force in the super G.

Basically, every slope she took a shot at, she set ablaze. But she is not one to blow on her smoking gun.

"I could not have envisioned it, to be honest," she said of her unflinching reign of domination. "Confidence isn't something I'm able to boast about. I have confidence in my skiing, but I'm actually a pretty shy person. I'm an introvert at heart. So this level of success ... it's incredible, but it's also really hard to process what's happened this season."

By all appearances, Shiffrin is a stone-cold racecourse killer. She is methodical and calculated in every knife cut she makes. She almost never crashes or misses a gate. She's somehow able to lie down and take power naps between runs ... sometimes right on the snow with her helmet still on. When she crosses the finish line, she rarely screams or waves to the crowd, not even when she looks at the clock to see that she's left everyone else in the dust. After she collapsed in tears in the finish area upon notching her fourth straight World Championship slalom title – the only skier in history to accomplish such a feat - she later attributed this unique display of emotion to the severe respiratory illness she was suffering from at the time and subsequent physical exhaustion.

The reality is that victory and dominance don't register with Shiffrin the way they do with those of us watching. And she never enters any start house with intentions of slaying the field.

"I go into every race and expect nothing other than to do the best I can with the task at hand," she says. "If it works out, that's great. It's been the mentality that has driven me through the season."

She swears that if she thinks about winning, she "almost never" wins.

"The truth is, when I think about results on race day, I rarely get the results. I bring the intensity too hard, I make a mistake or mis-time my turns and I'm disappointed," she says. "I let the result get in the way of the process of skiing. I just focus on the skiing, on the turns. People talk about my celebration or lack thereof in the finish, but it's because I'm always processing. When I'm racing or training, I love the feeling of doing it, of making turns."

Shiffrin's imagination does, however, occasionally shift into high-drama technicolor ... just not on the racecourse.

"Going through a workout, it is very cinematic in my mind," she says. "When I'm in the gym and have a hard set of intervals, that's when I start thinking about winning races like that heroic, sporting moment that leaves you in tears when you're watching a movie. But the reflection [after a win] is always different than the image of what it will feel like. For me, that's good. If I felt all the drama, the cinematic, inspirational feeling, the thing that makes you cry ... if I felt that every single race, I don't think I could do that well."

Skiing is not the only subject that occupies the young athlete's imagination. Anyone who follows Shiffrin on social media knows she has a solid sense of rhythm off the race hill, too. The girl has some serious shuffle dance moves and isn't afraid to do them in her ski boots.

"I love dancing, I love learning new things," she says. "I like simple things like watching TV shows. One of my pre-race routines is watching a 'Friends' video or Jenna Marbles on YouTube. It's super light-hearted and makes me laugh. That's another thing I've been doing more of this season is shutting down my brain and lightening things up."

It turns out that levity is a key ingredient in Shiffrin's recipe for success.

"In a world where we're in Europe traveling for six months and in the summer, in the gym preparing for those six months, you have to keep things focused, that's the job," she says. "Those little things that make me happy are a break from the job. They're small things ... small things that keep me going."

Shiffrin has also found a way to shake off the pressure ... and that's no small thing.

"One of my big focuses over the last two seasons was to not worry about everyone else's expectations – to accept that people have them, because my track record is good, but not let that get to me," she says. "When you don't have expectations, it's really easy to exceed them." Super G 2018 Lake Louise FIS World Cup

A Heartfelt Farewell

Lindsey Vonn's final performance fit perfectly into her pattern of heroic, comeback-laden career

merica's greatest skier of all time will be remembered for many great things.

With 82 World Cup victories stretching over 14 years, as well as three Olympic and eight World Championship medals, Lindsey Vonn will go down in history as the most-winning female ski racer of all time. She is also personally responsible for putting alpine skiing on the map in the United States. She became not only the face of the sport, but also a household name throughout the country, even in places where ski slopes are as common as sharks in the desert.

She will be remembered for her fearlessness, her absolute indomitable ability to point her skis downhill, build speeds exceeding 80 mph, rattle around gates and soar over massive jumps — all while teetering on the threshold of control.

She will be regarded as one of the most resilient athletes of all time, stomping back into the start house after hideous, high-speed crashes resulting in one injury after another. There was the time she was airlifted off of a racecourse by helicopter, screaming in pain with a season-ending knee injury, only to return and reinjure the same knee the following season. She has shaken off multiple concussions, broken bones, torn tendons and severe nerve damage, bouncing back after being sidelined for entire winters. While many athletes never return to form after even one serous injury, Vonn got back in the saddle every time. She did not just ride it out, she whipped herself back to a fierce gallop with guns blazing every single time.

Holding the torch high

More than anything, Lindsey Vonn will be remembered for her heart.

After weeks of painful deliberation and foiled attempts to surpass Swedish racer Ingemar Stenmark's record of 86 World Cup wins, Vonn concluded it was time to retire, that all those crashes had in fact, taken their toll.

"It was clear my body wasn't going to continue doing what I wanted it to," she said, announcing she would race for the last time at February's 2019 FIS Alpine World Ski Championships in Are, Sweden.

Of course, she did not go quietly.

All of Vonn's most memorable qualities were on dramatic display leading up to her final event — the World Championship downhill. Six days before the race, in her final super G, she hooked a ski and flew right through a gate panel, headfirst onto the rock-solid slope, then into the fence. Despite feeling like she'd "been hit by an 18-wheeler," bruised, battered and sporting a black eye, Vonn stepped back into the start gate. She was not going to miss her final downhill. But it was her heart alone that got her through it.

"I fought with my heart the whole way down," she said after the race. "I just charged. I gave it everything I have like always."

Fittingly, the effort amounted to yet another medal. The 34-yearold Vail resident walked away with bronze, the oldest female to medal in World Championship history and the only woman to medal in six World Championships.

"To end on this note with another World Championship medal means everything to me," she said.

The next chapter

As for the future, many people would like to see Vonn remain in the world of professional skiing as a coach or commentator. Forget that idea ... at least for now.

"It would make me too sad," Vonn said. "I want to be still here. I still want to be racing. I accept that I can't, but I still want to be here, so if I were to be involved in skiing [outside of racing], that would make me even more sad. I need a break."

Vonn hopes to start a family at some point and is plotting various business ventures. She has mentioned involvement in film production, a possible line of beauty products and continued partnership with long-time sponsors Red Bull, Head and Under Armour. She also plans to dedicate more time to the Lindsey Vonn Foundation, the organization she launched in 2015 with a mission to empower and inspire young girls through camps, speaker series and scholarships to help each child pursue her personal dream. Vonn has attended every Foundation event since its inception.

Heart of gold

In spite of soaring at the top of a sport that is highly individual, where every friend and peer is also a competitor, Vonn has always dedicated time and energy to supporting others. This has meant maneuvering through feisty mobs, sometimes even jumping fences to autograph helmets or take selfies with admiring children, sticking around the finish area long after her own race is over to watch and support her teammates. Take for instance her emotional moment when she learned of a young fan fighting brain cancer, 14-year-old Hedda Sivertsen. Vonn recorded a video that encouraged her to "stay strong and never give up."

During her final press conference as a ski racer this winter, Vonn revealed her future plans also include yet another knee surgery -- her eighth. It turns out she had completely torn the fibular collateral ligament (LCL) in a training crash back in November.

Like the others, she said she will put this quickly behind her ... and she truly hopes it will be her last.

Then she was asked how she wants to be remembered.

"I would like to be remembered as someone who was more than a ski racer," Vonn said. "Hopefully to my teammates, I was a good leader. Hopefully to the next generation, I showed them that nothing is impossible."

Palisade International Honeybee Festival

The Basics: This free, community-driven celebration will have the town of Palisade buzzing on Saturday, April 13, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Palisade Town Plaza, 175 East Third Street, Palisade. For all the details visit *palisadehoneybeefest.org*.

Palisade might be known nationwide for its mouthwatering peaches, but this month it's all about honeybees, which are threatened by everything from mites and viruses to climate change. "The bee decline is a serious subject, but we think a spoonful of honey helps the message go down," says Jean Tally, a volunteer coordinator for the Palisade International Honeybee Festival.

Approaching its 11th year, this delightfully sweet street fair has doubled in size since its inception in 2008, when community activists from Colorado's agricultural core rallied to bring awareness to the honeybee crisis through education and the arts. This month, 500-plus guests are expected to turn out for a daylong gala centered around speakers from area organizations such as Bookcliff Gardens, expounding on topics surrounding pollinator-friendly gardening.

Beekeepers bring their hives to Main Street, joining an array of informational booths manned by experts discussing commercial and backyard beekeeping. Nearby, local chefs will demonstrate innovative ways to cook with products derived from bees, including, of course, honey. The whole thing is set to the tune of bluegrass from the Pollinators, a local band Tally describes as, "A group of pickers roaming the festival."

Aimed at educating the next generation of beekeepers, the International Honeybee Festival is a kid-friendly spectacle incorporating craft tents, face painters and a mid-morning story hour at the Mesa County Library, at 119 West 3rd Street. Young festivalgoers also are invited to participate in an annual spelling bee, along with an adorable bee costume contest that entices pet owners and a few grownups, too.

You won't go hungry while perusing the fair. Onsite vendors serve everything from gumbo to ice cream, says Tally, and can't-miss restaurants include 13 Brix Cider Bistro and the Palisade Café. Festivities kick off Friday, April 12, with a welcoming reception at Blue Pig Gallery, 101 West 3rd Street, from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. After sampling honey wines from Meadery of the Rockies, guests are invited to peruse bee art and learn about beekeeping practices, high-altitude farming and bee-friendly insects. Making a weekend of it? Consider bunking at the Wine Country Inn, offering special festival rates.

Nourished Festival

The Basics: Focused on topics in specialty diets, this unique festival runs Saturday, May 18, through Sunday, May 19, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the National Western Complex, 4655 Humboldt Street, Denver. Tickets, available at the door, are \$15 for adults and \$5 for kids, with a 20-percent discount offered for online purchases through May 17. Presented by Enjoy Life Foods, Nourished Festival (previously the Gluten-Free Allergen-Friendly Expo) is a multicity extravaganza created for gluten-intolerant festivalgoers, designed to "nourish the needs of the entire food community, whether it is those with celiac disease, autism, autoimmune or inflammatory conditions — or anyone committed to living a healthy lifestyle," says Nourished Festival founder and CEO Jen Cafferty.

Cafferty launched her homegrown festival 11 years ago in Chicago, where the first few gatherings were modest affairs with small cooking classes and a few retailers. This year's Denver exhibition is expected to draw 2,500 attendees to the National Western Complex for one-on-one moments with more than 100 allergy-friendly brands exhibiting their best products for food sensitivities and modified diets.

It's a good idea to show up hungry. In addition to sampling the latest gluten-free, nut-free, Paleo, Keto and plant-based products, treats also are available for purchase at Nourished Festival. Don't even think about skimping on baked goods, pizza and grain-free chocolate protein bars.

Guests supplement their cravings with a slew of educational presentations hosted by industry veterans, restaurateurs, authors and bloggers. Highlights include a workshop on healing autoimmune disorders with Dr. Peter Kan, Saturday, and a lecture on the gut-brain connection from Desiree Nielsen, a registered dietician with an integrative approach to health. Cooking-related classes range from gluten-free meal prepping with Cassy Joy Garcia to the Sauce Goddess lecture on infusing flavor into gluten-free meals. (Yes you can!)

If you're visiting with your children, check out the "Kid Zone," where families gather for crafts, toys, books, games and more. There's a lot to absorb in a few short hours. As Cafferty puts it, "An event of this scale being accessible to the general public offers a rare and exciting way to explore new food options." water event, held Memorial Day Weekend, Friday, May 24, through Monday, May 27, in Buena Vista. For all the details visit *ckspaddlefest.com*. Situated smack-dab on the Arkansas River, it's no wonder the scenic little town of Buena Vista gets giddy over the start of summer paddling season. Since 2005, thousands of whitewater aficionados have converged

in central Colorado to rub elbows with big-name paddling manufacturers, top professional athletes and other industry leaders during a weekend chock full of education, entertainment, demonstrations and steeply discounted gear, the latter available at the annual CKS Gear Swap and Storewide Sale on Main Street.

If you're new to paddling – or Paddlefest – start with a flatwater demonstration at the Town Pond at McPhelemy Park, behind the intersection of Highway 24 and Main Street, where festivalgoers can test a variety of gear from participating brands. Along Main Street, gurus from Rocky Mountain Outdoor Center put on more than a dozen clinics and workshops, covering a range of topics designed to appeal to paddlers of all ages and ability levels.

Whitewater courses are available on the Arkansas River, too, home to the Kayak Rodeo, a multiday freestyle paddling competition. [This is] "one of our most popular spectator events," says Megan Kingman, owner of CKS Main Street, the retailer hosting Paddlefest. Amateur and professional SUP competitions follow the Kayak Rodeo, and – new this year – Paddlefest will be the official host for the 2019 U.S. National Freestyle Championships, the official team trials for Team USA's freestyle kayaking team.

Informal group paddles offer an opportunity for visitors to explore sections of the river with fellow paddlers. Beyond paddle sports, CKS Paddlefest is a celebration of Colorado's coveted outdoor lifestyle. So look for fitness and yoga workshops throughout the event, as well as the Yucca Classic disc golf tournament, Saturday at 9 a.m., Peak Fitness's bouldering competition, Sunday at noon, and a Badfish River Surf Competition on Sunday at 2 p.m. — and consider registering for the 5th Annual Paddlefest Spirit Half Marathon, a trail run beginning Sunday at 8:15 a.m.

After you've sought sustenance from local food trucks and vendors – including the Buena Viking – wind down with live music, offered afternoons and evenings at the Beach at South Main, 701 Front Loop. Cocktails on the patio at Deerhammer Distillery are always a good idea. Did we mention Elevation Beer Co. is stocking its beer garden with local libations?



Indian Market and Powwow

The Basics: Saturday, June 1, and Sunday, June 2, Tesoro Cultural Center brings its annual Indian Market and Powwow to The Fort Restaurant, 19192 Highway 8, Morrison, where \$10 gets ticketholders access to a bustling marketplace and artsy gathering on the grounds of one of Colorado's most iconic restaurants. Parking is free, as are kids 12 and under. For all the details visit *tesoroculturalcenter.org/19th-annual-powwow-2019*.

Entering its 19th season, the Indian Market and Powwow is a two-day celebration of American Indian art and culture created by Holly Arnold Kinney, proprietor of The Fort Restaurant and Tesoro Cultural Center's executive director. After relocating to Denver from Santa Fe in the late 1950s, Kinney's parents – amateur historians with a penchant for southwestern lore – set out to build an exact replica of Bent's Old Fort, a fur trading post that operated along the famous Santa Fe Trail in the 1830s.

After procuring property near Red Rocks, the Arnolds began fabricating their one-of-a-kind home with 80,000 handmade adobe bricks. But when they ran out of money mid-construction, lenders urged the Arnolds to turn their residence into a profitable business — so they opened a ground-level restaurant paying homage to area history with regional dishes made from bison, elk, quail and plenty of heirloom grains.

Kinney grew up in The Fort, and she learned the restaurant biz while inheriting from her parents a deep interest in local history. "It was always Holly's dream to open a living history experience," explains Chelsea Coe, spokesperson for Tesoro Cultural Center, the nonprofit organization Kinney founded in 1999 to protect and celebrate the history and shared experiences of Colorado's early settlers.

Kinney unveiled the Indian Market and Powwow a year later, to highlight award-winning American Indian artists – Jesse Hummingbird, Pahponee and Eddie Morrison, among others – who demonstrate and sell their authentic artwork in a juried show alongside a Powwow honoring, for 2019, Sergeant First Class Cindy Littlefeather.

"The powwow is like a juried dance competition," explains Coe. Performers from over a dozen tribes compete in individual and team categories, presenting an array of native dances including fancy, grass and jingle. "Dances are performed traditionally, in a big circle with live music," Coe continues. Guests will also hear original songs from award-winning singer and songwriter Rose Red Elk, also known as Red Feather Woman.

"Many of the musical performances, and some of the dancing, will be interactive for guests," Coe says, noting that children usually jump at the chance to participate in the show. Denver Museum of Nature and Science sponsors a kid-friendly booth with hands-on activities, and HawkQuest will be onsite, too, with live hawk and eagle demonstrations. Don't forget to sample Indian fry bread from the Tocabe food truck, and stick around for dinner at The Fort, offering a special festival menu on Saturday and Sunday.



Denver Cherry Blossom Festival

The Basics: If you're into sake, teriyaki chicken and taiko drumming, head to Sakura Square, on Lawrence Street, between 19th and 20th streets, on Saturday, June 22, and Sunday, June 23, for a free festival opening at 11 a.m. both days. For all the details visit *cherryblossomdenver.org*.

In late June, Denver's modest Japanese-American district is packed – and we mean packed – with kimono-clad shoppers, and a handful of anime cosplayers, delighting in Sakura Matsuri, Denver's yearly Cherry Blossom Festival, drawing upward of 35,000 festivalgoers from across the nation.

Tri-State/Denver Buddhist Temple's primary fundraiser – and the only outdoor Japanese festival in the region – the Cherry Blossom Festival stretches back to the 1970s, when the inaugural gathering marked the grand opening of Sakura Square, the last remaining section of Denver's onetime Japantown, originally a nine-block concentration of Japanese-American homes and businesses that cropped up in the late 1940s, post-internment, when approximately 120,000 Japanese-Americans relocated to downtown Denver.

Deemed blighted, the Japanese-American district was leveled in the 1960s — except for one square block bordered by 19th and 20th and Lawrence and Larimer streets. Members of the temple purchased that space in 1971, and built Sakura Square in an effort to preserve their local heritage.

Taiko drumming is one of the most-popular offerings at the Cherry Blossom Festival, and it is accompanied by a range of authentic entertainment including Japanese singing and dancing on a main stage at the temple.

Meanwhile, Lawrence Street is transformed into a marketplace where vendors sell t-shirts, handmade soaps, posters and plenty of Japanese artwork. "All vendors are required to have items that are Japanese or reflect Japanese-American heritage," explains Stacey Shigaya, program director for the Sakura Foundation, an organization created to help sustain the temple and further its mission.

In a designated art area below the temple, Japanese artists exhibit work rooted in culture, and many are happy to teach curious guests about their technique. But sometimes the best way to learn about another culture is through food — and there's plenty of that at the Cherry Blossom Festival.

"Look for Japanese food throughout the street fair," Shigaya suggests, pointing to teriyaki chicken, sushi, cold somen noodles and a dessert called manju (pounded rice filled with sweet bean paste). Inside the temple gymnasium, visitors will find craft beer and sake for sale, along with a few mouthwatering snacks. Nearby, a Buddhist minister will give dharma talks throughout the day. \Box




